Proceedings of the board of supervisors of DuPage county, Illinois, at a mosting held in the court house, in the city of Wheaton, on Wednesday, the 15th day of October, A. D. 1903. Meeting cailed to order with Supervisor Betts presiding. On roll call all members answered to their names, excep Supervisors Wiant and Christie. coodings of the last preceding meeting were read and declared approved.


