The circuit court has been in session four days with Judge Bishop on the bench and the way work has been turned out most of itself by very gratifying to the taxpayers who have to foot the bill. One-half of the criminal docket has been disposed of, and three prisoners sentenced to Joliet. Eradore Thomas for arson; Frank Lange for burglary and larceny, and Thomas Mulvey for larceny. All of these plead guilty. Of the thirty-nine common law cases twenty have been tried, settled or continued. Of the seventy-four chancery cases thirty-one have been disposed of. All of these cases were short—they had to be—but the disposal of that number of cases in so short a time proves that Judge Bishop has the details well in hand and is dispensing justice in a business like way.

At a meeting of the board of supervisors Wednesday routine business was transacted, bills allowed, reports of the county officers presented and approved and the salaries of some of the county officers fixed for the coming year. The salary of the sheriff was raised from \$1,200 to \$1,500; county clerk from \$1,500 to \$2,000; county treasurer, \$1,500 to \$1,600; county judge, \$1,200 to \$1,400. The county superintendent was also allowed \$800 for clerk hire. The various county officers are all earning amounts far in excess of their salary and clerk hire expenses and as the business of the office increases the salary must follow suit. This county was also changed by the last census, owing to increased population from a first to a second class county. The statute also raises the salary when a county goes from first to second class.
