Arrangements have been completed at Northwestern college of Naperville for a league among the colleges of northern Illinois whose express purpose it shall be to promote the interest of oratory in northern Illinois. Each institution shall be represented by two orators and prizes of \$20 and \$10 are offered for the first and second places. The first contest will be held at Northwestern April 24.

Representative citizens interested in the formation of the Young Peoples' League met in the club rooms Tuesday night and unanimously adopted the constitution and by-laws presented by the organization committee. The constitution provide a mutual improvement organization for the intellectual, physical, social and moral development of the young men and women of the village. Membership fees of \$5 for men and \$1 for women are provided, with annual dues of \$10 for men and \$5 for women. A committee was appointed to solicit members. The plan of the originators of the league is to provide an organization along lines beneficial to young men and women, comprising a gymnasium, free reading rooms and other features.
