LOSES ONE MILLION IN TWELVE MONTHS

Gambiers Get That Amount From Theodore R. Hostetter, Who 'Died'in a Sanitarium.

New York dispatch: Theodore R Hostetter, the multimillionaire, who at the age of 32 died suddenly at a Park avenue satitarium in August dast, left a check book which shows that during the final year of his life he lost \$636,000 at gambling in this city. The places he patronized were those run by Richard Canfield, Phil Daly and Dave Johnson. It is stated by Hostetter's friends that in addition to the sums indicated by the checks he also lost thousands of dollars in cash. His passion for gambling, it is estimated cost him a least \$1,000,000 during the last twelve months of his life. The attention of the executors of the Hostetter estate was called to the gambling items by a suit just compromised which was brought by Dave Johnson to recover \$115,000 on a note and checks given by young Hostetter just before he

LIVE STOCK.

Statistics Show Consumption at the Five Leading Centers.

Washington special: Chicago's consumption of live stock in 1902 amounted to 12,539,717 head, according to the December summary of internal commerce just issued by the treasury bureau of statistics. The receipts at the five leading stockyards of Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Louis and St. Joseph during the year were: Cattle, 7,710,559 head; hogs, 15,614,129. The average weight of the 7,895,238 hogs received in Chicago was 220 pounds. The contributions of live stock to railway traffic at these five markets amounted to 588,245 cars. compared with 622,352 cars in 1901, and 582,257 cars in 1900. It would thus seem that the high tide of live stock traffic was reached in 1901. The stock of cut meats at the five markets of Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Louis and Milwaukee Dec. 31, 1901, amounted to 269,137,147 pounds. On the corresponding date of 1902 the stocks were 179,029,100 pounds.

HYDROPHOBIA AMONG SHEEP

Widespread Epidemie is Feared by Farmers in Wisconsin.

Kenosha, Wis., special: Farmers residing in the town of Bristol fear an epidemic of hydrophobia among the sheep of the county. A short time ago a mad dog passed through this section of the county and bit a number of sheep. In one flock, belonging to William Stevens, five sheep already have gone mad and, breaking from their pastures, invaded other flocks. As soon as possible the afflicted sheep were killed, but it is feared that thousands of sheep have been bitten.' In some cases other animals were attacked and it is feared that the infection is widespread.

MAN SHOOTS HEAD OF

Ends Life When Accused of Attempting to Polson Son.

Rush City, dispatch: Mike Rumpel, an old resident of this section, committed suicide by nearly blowing his head off with a shotgun. He had been accused of attempting to poison his son George by putting a quantity of carbolic acid in some medicine. The son had, an analysis made, which rerealed the carbolic acid. Previous to being taken to jail Rumpel shot half of his face off. Death resulted in a few hours.

THE POLICE OF LONDON.

They Keep Great Metropolis Compara

The annual report of the chief of the metropolitan police of London sent to the home secretary is interesting reading. London has an area (exclusive of the city proper) of 688 square miles, being a radius of fifteen miles from Charing Cross. The London corporation and its police have control over the small area which includes the district of St. Paul's and the Bank of England. But for the large area outside London has a police force of 16, 000 men, 60 per cent of whom are employed on night duty. The number of persons apprehended in the year 1901 was over 119,000, or 1,200 more than in

The police cost London \$6,980,000 for the year 1901, which is not grudged when it is remembered that felonies relating to property were over 17,000 in 1901, or 1,000 more than in the previous year. And yet, for all this mass of crime, London, or that part of it which the visitor sees, is as reputable and as crimeless and as safe as any rural village. The police find most of their work in the overcrowded districts, where poverty and public houses keep each other company.

BREAD RECIPE.

To one quart of lukewarm wetting-half water and half milk, or To one quart of lukewarm wetting—fall water and half milk, or water alone—add two half-ounce compressed yeast cakes, or the usual quantity of liquid yeast, and stir until dissolved.

Add one teaspoonful of salt and three tablespoonfuls of suggrand when well dissolved, stir in with moden apoon, three quarts of well sifted flour, or until dough is sufficiently stiff to be turned from the mixing bowl to the moulding board in a mass.

If shortening is desired add two tablespoonfuls land.

Kneed this dough, adding if necessary from time to lime, flour until it becomes smooth and elastic and ceases to stick to fingers or heard.

Do not make dough too stiff. Spring Whent Flour needs a little more working than Winter Wheat Flour, and should be a little solver to make it rise properly.
