The method of distributing the with everybody getting aboard the was outnumbered almost two to one by Mochel's friends, who had lost him the nomination the year previous by their absence from the caucus. Mochel received almost a hundred more votes Saturday than he had last year, while

Gesner gained only four. The caucus was called to order in the Auditorium by John W. Graves. C. V. Carpenter nominated Howard P. Jones who was chosen as chairman, and Bert C. White was named for secretary. John W. Graves and G. H. Bunge were made tellers. Upon call for nominations for village president E. H. Prince presented the name of L. B. Gesper in a speech in which he went on record as favoring local improvements. The nomination was seconded by M. A. Sacksteder.

M. Slusser nominated Charles Mochel and spoke of the necessity of choosing a man who was closely identified with the village interests and one whose own business permitted him to be in the village at all hours where the progress of such improvements as might be made could be under his personal supervision. W. S. Waples and others seconded the nomination and a ballot

was taken. The result showed Mochel a winner by a majority of 62 votes—the ballot being Mochel, 164: Gesner, 102. Upon motion of Hugh M. White, seconded by unanimous nomines of the caucus for

The nomination of village trustees being next in order, Guy L. Bush pre-E. C. Kuenzel nominated C. H. Staats. Whiffin for north side trustee to succeed E E. Stevens, The ballot resulted in Staats receiving 141 votes to Whiffin's 87. Upon motion of Mr. Kuenzel the caucus declared Mr. Staats unani-

mously chosen. D. G. Graham presented C. F. Davis to succeed L. Klein, and there being no further nominations Mr. Davis was, on motion of M. B. Downer, unaminously

Capt. T. S. Rogers presented the name of Bert C. White for village clerk and asked the nomination by acclamation. He got his request with a mighty roar of approval from the caucus, and after the appointment of a caucus committee composed of J. W. Graves, C. V. Carpenter and W. W. Gourley, the meeting adjourned.
