The idea of object teaching, the foundation of the Froebel system of instruction, has in recent years met with general acceptance and adoption in almost every branch of education, high and low, with resultant benefits which are beyond question. Even such subjects as grammar and arithmetic are now taught in this way so far as practicable, and with marked advantage over the old dry and abstract methods. The practice of teaching history by making pilgrimages to the very scenes where great historical events have occurred is an application the same principle and much more Valuable in the way of impressing the reality of history upon the minds of the young than any amount of mere text-book instruction could be. A recent issue of the "Four-Track Series, published by the New York Central management, gives a description of the historical sites in the immediate vicinity of New York, which will be of exceeding value for the guidance of teachers and others who desire to adopt this method of historical study. One of the best ways to develop civic pride and promote good citizenship lies in this very direction, an increase of knowledge of local history being accompanied with an increase of interest in matters of local government and a higher concern for what affects the welfare and good name of ing. the community.—From Leslie's Week-

Sir Hector Macdonald Commits Sui-

cide to Avert Disgrace. "Fighting Mac," Sir Hector Macdonald, one of the most popular generals in the British army, shot himself in a bedroom in a Paris hotel last week to escape the disgrace of a courtmartial on charges of immorality in

Ceylon. Few officers of the British army had a more brilliant record than Major General Sir Hector Archibald Macdonald. He was a typical Highlander in appearance, a Highlander of the best

He was born in 1852 in a crofter's cottage in Ross-shire and there was little in his early life to presage his later eminence. His father and mother were simple people, who saw little advancement for their son in following their footsteps, so, with a view to bettering his prospects, they put ner. him into a small draper's shop when he had had his modicum of school-

After awhile he decided to enlist in

the army as a result of difference of opinions between himself and his employers. He went to Fort George; took the Queen's shilling and became a recruit' in the Ninety-second Highlanders, the famous Gordon regi ment, which has furnished so many heroes. Thus in 1871, when he was only nineteen, the future hero of Omdurman began his career at the very bottom rung of the ladder as a simple private.

A simple private was the one thing he determined he would not remain. He had made up his mind to rise, and in three years he was made color sergeant. In 1878 he was out in India under General Roberts and served in the Afghan campaign, taking his part in the march on Candahar.

Since the Afghan campaign he has been prominent in every war in which Great Britain has been involved, winning particular distinction in the Soudan campaign and the late Boer

Extraordinary rumors are current about Macdonald's suicide. The nearest clew to the nature of the accusations is provided by a Paris newspaper which connects his name with certain clubs in London. Another report hints that suicide was recommended to Macdonald as the only thing he could do in the face of certain revelations which would annihilate his reputation.

Macdonald went to Paris from London where he had an interview with Lord Roberts, commander-in-chief of the British army, who told him to return to Ceylon and meet the charges like a soldier.

A Patriotic Pincushion.

A very pretty little pincushion can be made of small American flags. To make the cushion two silk flags will be needed. The best flags are those that are made of ribbon about three inches wide. This ribbon may be 46 D bought by the yard. About nine inches will be needed for a cushion three inches wide. For a cushion of this size you will need about 16 inches of red silk ribbon three-quarters of an inch wide. The ribbon should be the exact shade of the red in the flag. Wool, or old woolen rags, make the best stuffing.

To make the cushion follow the exact plan of a bed mattress, cut the flag ribbon exactly in half for the top and bottom of the cushion, sew the ribbon arcund the edges of top and bottom with 1 .! silk, overhand stitch. leaving one end open to insert the stuffing. When this is done close the end like the other. Then with red silk tuft your cushion just like a matress. Sachet powder may be put inside the cushion if you wish. If the cushien is to be hung up, attach a piece of the red ribbon to one cor-
