## Dennison's Body Found

### Body of Missing Hinsdale Man Found in Niagara River.

John W. Webster, DuPage County Pioneer Dead—Aged man Horribly Injured in Runaway—Other County News from Exchanges.

The body of Charles G. Dennison, the Hinsdale man who disappeared in Buffalo on March 18, was found in the Niagara river Friday, in Bass Rock eddy, below the Horseshoe falls. After he left the Broedel hotel, not a trace was found of him until a teamster called the attention of Chief Wilcox, head of the Victorian park police, to a body that was floating in the water. Chief Wilcox drew the corpse to shore by means of a pole, and last night it was taken to Buffalo, having been identified by William H. Watts, a detective who had been working on the disappearance. The body had no coat or vest on it, but the action of the water doubtless tore these garments away. The mystery probably never will be solved. It is evident the body went over the Horseshoe falls, and perhaps floated for a long time before reaching the falls in the deep pools of the upper Niagara. Mr. Dennison was a member of the Sidney Shepard Hardware company, and lived in Hinsdale. He went to Buffalo to attend a meeting of the hardware concern.

John Wesley Webster, one of Hinsdale's early and highly esteemed residents passed away Thursday evening at his late residence on South Lincoln street. The cause of his illness and death was heart failure. The previous Sunday he had been able to take a ride, and to take dinner with his daughter, Mrs. John Hall, and the family did not realize the approach of the end until Thursday night when about 8:30 he was taken with a sinking spell. Two hours later he passed away, with little suffering, and surrounded by most of his family. Mr. Webster was born at Pompey, Onondaga county, and was 77 years of age. Coming west in 1840 he settled in Milton township, near Wheaton, and became prominent in the affairs of this section in those early days. He married Miss Lucy N. Dodge, January 1, 1854, and the happily mated couple began their married life on a neighboring farm. Ten children came to bless this union, eight of whom with their mother survive their father, and with the exception of one they all reside in Hinsdale.

John Dolson, founder of the Dolson & Shepard Stone company, was seriously injured in a runaway Thursday morning at his nephew's poultry farm which adjoins Oak Forest cemetery north of Hinsdale. He was helping in drawing the mulching for the young trees which the nurserymen were setting out, and was driving a spirited young team, which became unmanageable. He was thrown from the wagon and fell between the axle and a tree. The team could not be stopped and when help reached him he was unconscious. Doctors Hensch and Lawton were called and for six hours worked over their patient. Until three o'clock it was feared he would not survive, but finally revived sufficiently to be moved to his son's home in Morton Park. The injuries were very serious for a man of 67 years. His right leg and arm were broken, his head was frightfully bruised and many other injuries sustained.

Carl Miller of Naperville was sent to the Elgin asylum about three years ago and after serving two years there returned to Naperville. He has been using tobacco and drinking excessively the past month, which put him in a very nervous and almost insane condition. He was sent to Wheaton Wednesday to be tried for insanity, and after the jury heard the evidence they thought the father of the boy would become his more fit subject for the asylum than the son, and Carl was allowed to return home. Carl is 24 years old. His mother went insane a few weeks after he was born, but has since died.

Ballasting on the Elgin branch of the electric is completed. The fences are built between Wheaton and Wayne. It will take about four days to complete the fences between Wayne and Elgin. The third rail is laid between Wheaton and Clintonville with exception of crossing connections. The entire line will be completed and cars running before June first. Cars will use the third rail to Clintonville next week.

On May first the electric put a milk car on its line for the accommodation of farmers. This is indeed a convenience for dairymen living near the line as any cross road which will pledge a certain number of cans will get a milk stand and the car will go over the line at an hour most convenient to the majority of farmers.

Additional service will be added as business warrants. M. D. McCarthy, a brakeman on the "J" was quite badly injured at West Chicago Monday, while uncoupling the air hose between two cars. A freight car thrown against the end of the train forced the cars together catching his head. One ear was nearly severed and a bad gash cut on the other side of the head. Dr. Isherwood dressed the wound and is in hopes of saving the ear.—Journal.

T. A. Wilson, boiler-maker at the West Chicago round house, was badly scalded by steam, Tuesday night. He got into a fire-box of an engine carrying sixty pounds of steam to do a little calking. One of the plugs blew out and he could not get out of the door quick enough. If he had been less supple or slow in his movements he would have been scalded to death.—Journal.

Before long Judge Ruth will announce his appointments on the board of review. By virtue of his office as chairman of the board of supervisors, Thomas Betts of Naperville is already a member. The other two members are appointed and enter upon their duties about July first.

The election of Judges of this Judicial Circuit occurs on June first. There is only one ticket in the field and the election will not be as exciting as some have been in the past. The three judges now presiding will be their own successors.

Commencing last Saturday the county offices in the court house will be closed Saturday afternoons during the summer months.

Frederick Schroeder, aged 89 years, a pauper from Addison township, died at the county farm Monday night of old age.
