Young Burglars Nabbed

Wheaton Boys Supposed to be Implicated in Robberies Arrested.

New Dining Hall at Penitentiary Opened—Hinsdale Man Disappears With Funds—Other County News Taken From Exchanges.

Ernest Guild, 16 years old, and William Hart, a lad about the same age, were arrested in Wheaton Saturday charged with burglary, says the Democrat. The boys confessed to robbing the summer home of C. P. McAvoy of the Peabody Coal company of goods to the value of nearly one thousand dollars. Both boys have been bright pupils in the Wheaton high school and their attendance at church and the Sunday school classes, together with their membership in two of the best known families of the town, contributed to the amazement of our people when they were arrested by Sheriff Hiser on charges of having broken into the home of C. P. McAvoy during the prolonged absence of the family and stolen plunder valued at \$1,000. Among the most valuable articles that McAvoy missed were a number of guns, revolvers and swords, including an English fowling piece valued at \$600. Several of the weapons were relics that McAvoy had collected. Sheriff Hiser's investigation was aided by the fact that a playmate of the two suspects had recently displayed the fowling piece. He is said to have paid \$5 for it. "Neither of the boys seems able to tell why they stole the things," said the sheriff last night. In addition to the articles stolen from the McAvoy residence, the boys destroyed a bust of Mr. McAvoy's father, valued at \$500. The houses of J. B. Russell, Dr. W. H. Vanderhoof, Wm. E. Gary, Allen Brock and Judge DeWolf have been entered in the last two months and the two boys under arrest are suspected of these burglaries.

The new dining room wing of the state penitentiary was opened Friday and the hearts of over 1,900 prisoners were made glad by the innovation. For the first time in 22 years the inmates of this institution were permitted to sit at a table and enjoy a meal. Heretofore the "lifers" have eaten their meals in narrow cells with their bunks for a table. The opening took place under the direction of Warden Murphy and a score of guards. There was a large crowd of invited guests to witness the unique ceremony. The prisoners marched in orderly columns and readily filled the seats. The structure cost \$45,000 and is complete in all its details. The men when eating all face one way. Waiters pass up and down and the prisoners are given all they wish to eat. Roast beef, mashed potatoes, tomato soup and bread were served Saturday. Twenty minutes is allowed for eating. A set of rules governing the new dining hall have been printed and distributed among the prisoners.

Last Saturday there were eight children ranging in age from 1 to 13 years—six girls and two boys—the children of Alois Bauer of Naperville, brought to Wheaton and declared dependent in the county court. The mother, formerly Zetta Brown, is lying at the point of death from cancer, and the father a shiftless spendthrift, is roaming in the wide world not furnishing a cent for the support of his family. The children who have resided with their grandmother, Mrs. M. Brown, have been a town charge, but they need a different training, and the president of the Illinois Orphans home, Chicago, was in court and took charge of the poor little unfortunates. The grand jury would be doing something for humanity if they got after the father and showed him that pity for the children demanded justice for the man who would desert a sick wife and eight small children.

For some weeks there has been trouble between Mayor Collins, of Joliet and the board of alderman, the latter taking exception to the mayor's appointments and refusing to confirm them. As a result there has been a deadlock and little business accomplished. Last Sunday night there was a shooting scrap in a gambling joint in that city and one man was injured. The mayor promptly suspended the chief and members of the police force on the grounds of incompetency and immediately appointed his own men.

Elmhurst had quite a fire last Saturday. Early in the morning refuse was burned in an alley near Dick Hesterman's barn several hours thereafter Mr. Boetke drove to the barn to get a load of hay. In throwing the hay onto the wagon from the barn the wind carried some of the hay to the drying tubs of the fire and in less time than it takes to tell it the load of hay was on fire. The hay, wagon and barn went up in smoke.

There is now in formation, it is reported, a project to build a third rail electric line from Aurora to Chicago, paralleling the Burlington as the Chicago, Aurora & Wheaton line does the Northwestern.

NEW COUNTY FARM RULES.

Continued from the first page.

township statements every two months, to-wit: On the first days of January, March, May, July, September and November, in each year, showing what is due the county from the respective townships for the board and clothing of paupers at the poor farm, and like statements shall also be sent at the same time by the superintendent to the conservators or relatives of the respective bonded incurable insane persons, showing what is due the county for the clothing and board of such persons as fixed by the county board.

9. All payments which shall become due to the county as above provided by the respective towns for maintaining its paupers at the county poor farm and all payments which shall become due to the county for the care of any bonded incurable insane person at the county poor farm as above provided shall be paid to the superintendent on or before the 15th day of the month following the receipt of the superintendent shall be taken therefor.

The following report of the delegation from DuPage county to the St. Louis Good Roads convention was read and on motion of Supervisor Steven was approved: We, your delegates appointed to the national and international Good Roads convention, held on April 27, 28, 29, 1903, beg leave to report that we attended such convention and listened to reports and speeches from every state and territory in the United States, and also that there were present at said convention many gentlemen from foreign countries, and from said reports we desire to recommend to this board and to the people of DuPage county that a public meeting of the people of DuPage county be called at an early date for the purpose of forming an organization looking to the betterment of the roads and to be known as the Good Roads association of DuPage county. The purpose of the Good Roads association is to promote the interest of good roads in DuPage county, and said Good Roads association to co-operate with the highway commissioners of the respective towns of DuPage county and the state association of Good Roads.

We would recommend that a committee be appointed by the chair to take charge of said meeting and they be instructed to confer and invite Judges Geo. W. Brown and Linus C. Ruth and ex-Judge John H. Batten and others to address the convention on the question of the promotion of good roads in this county and further we recommend that this report be given to the county papers and that they be asked to co-operate in all the work necessary to interest the people of DuPage county in the betterment of the roads in this county.

And further we desire to report that your committee called on the St. Louis Art Metal company and purchased for the use of the Recorder's office a set of 21 shelves of steel to be added to said office at a cost of \$47.25, to be delivered a. o. b. at Wheaton.

In accordance with the foregoing report the chair appointed Supervisors McClintock and Hammerschmidt to take charge of the meeting referred to in said report. On motion of Supervisor Churchill the board took a recess to 1.30.

The claim of E. B. Howe, \$304.98, which was previously paid we have examined and find correct. The claim of the village of West Chicago for care of small pox patients, we refer to the full board. On motion of Supervisor Bartlett the claim was referred to the state's attorney with the request to render his opinion of the legality of the same to the board at its next meeting.

Supervisor Hammerschmidt, chairman of the finance committee, presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution: Whereas a personal property tax of \$35.18 for the year of 1902 was levied in the town of York, against the Pond Construction company, which said tax was returned delinquent by the township collector of said town of York, and whereas, since said tax was so levied, the said Pond Construction company have removed their property from the said county of DuPage to that of Cook, so that there is no property situated in said county of DuPage from which said tax can be made, and whereas, said personal tax has not been paid and there is due and owing the sum of \$35.18, and the warrant for the collection of said tax is in the hands of or of the county collector, therefore, be it resolved that the clerk of DuPage county be and is hereby directed and ordered to issue a warrant under his hand and the seal of his office, directed to any sheriff, coroner or constable of the county of Cook, commanding such officer to make the amount of said tax, together with costs and charges that may accrue, from the personal property of said company, situated in the county of Cook, according to law. On roll call the foregoing resolution was declared adopted.

On motion of Supervisor Churchill the board adjourned to Monday, June 8.
