Thus early in the season we observe the all-to-common item in our exchanges that Farmer Jones had one more head of stock killed by lightning in the pasture near the wire fence. A successful farmer tells the Herald that these losses may be largely prevented by simply grounding the wires in the fence every 90 rods or so. Get a 5/8 iron rod and drive it into the ground to a depth of three or four feet, pull it out and then take a strand of heavy fence wire and put down in the hole so made and tamp it down. Leave it long enough above the ground so it can be tightly wound around each strand of wire in the fence. A smart hand could easily fix all the fences on a quarter section farm in a day in the manner indicated, and it will pay to do it.—Harvard Herald.

Founder of Ruskin University No Longer Trustee of College.

DeKalb County Court House Fight Stirrs up Sandwich—Somonaug, City of Widows—Other County News From Exchanges

Sandwich people are now getting intensely interested in the matter of building the new DeKalb county court house. During the intense fight for its location, Sycamore residents raised \$70,000, the same to be applied towards the cost of construction, and placed the sum in the hands of a custodian. No that Sycamore has secured the building, that city and DeKalb are fixing up a plan to put the \$70,000 together with \$100,000 raised in DeKalb, into some county structure, preferably an Old People's home, to be located at some spot between the two cities. And here is where Sandwich kicks. The plan will, of course, throw the entire expense of the new court house on the county, and Sandwich, which lies in the extreme south end, and has no railway connection with the other two towns, will have to pay her full quota towards its erection, instead of reaping benefit of the application of Sycamore's \$70,000 on the building. Sandwich people say they will be satisfied if the \$70,000 shall be expended on an electric railway connecting Sandwich with the county seat.—Aurora News.

Because of the divorce proceedings brought against him on statutory grounds Walter Vrooman, the idealist and dreamer, the visionary seer of Utopian communities, the founder of Ruskin Hall at Oxford, England, of the Peoples Trust and the Western Co-operative system in Kansas and the Ruskin university now at Glen Ellyn, has been excluded from the management of his own institution. The board of directors of the Glen Ellyn college yesterday accepted, without comment or explanation, Vrooman's resignation from all connection with the educational system. The wealthy woman who married him to help him on with his work toward an earthly Utopia has withdrawn her support from him, but not from the university. He has been cast out of the great scheme. She will continue to further its ambitious and magnificent ends.

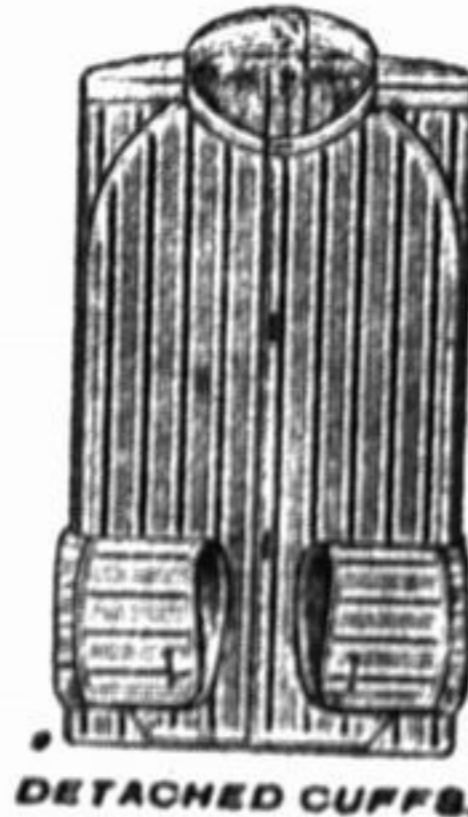
