Presbyterians Alter the Confession of Faith Along Modern Lines.

INFANTS ARE NOT CONDEMNED

God Has Provided in Christ a Salvation Sufficient for All; His Decree Hinders No Man From Accepting His Gracious Offer.

Los Angeles, Cal., special: Revision of the confession of faith-a subject which has agitated the Presbyterian church for fifteen years and has been discussed by three preceding general assemblies-was adopted by a unanimous vote by the present general assembly. This revision is the one rec ommended by the assembly which met in 1901. The action of the assembly was followed by twenty minutes of rejoicing in song and prayer.

Next in importance was the stand taken against divorce and the remarriage of divorced persons. There was no discussion of the report on this question, as this had been forestalled by the passage of the resolution enjoining the Presbyterian ministers from performing the marriage ceremony in cases of divorced persons. The report was unanimously adopted.

Big Crowd Attends. The fact that creed revision was to come up attracted the largest crowd that has attended any meeting since the opening. Moderator Coyle announced that the Rev. Henry Van Dyke of Princeton, N. J., chairman of the committee on bills and overtures, would submit the report of the committee on revision.

A declaratory statement which precedes the changes in the confession of faith was read and adopted by the assembly, after which Dr. Van Dyke read his report, as follows:

"The Presbyterian church in the United States does authoritatively declare:

Salvation in Christ. "That concerning those who are saved in Christ, the doctrine of God's eternal decree is held in harmony with the doctrine of his love to all mankind, his gift of his son to be the propitiation for the sins of the whole world, and his readiness to bestow his saving grace on all who seek it; that concerning those who perish, the doctrine of God's eternal decree is held in harmony with the doctrine that God desires not the death or any sinner, but has provided in Christ a salvation sufficient for all, adapted for all, and freely offered in the Gospel to all; that men are fully responsible for their treatment of God's gracious offer; that his decree hinders no man from accepting that offer, and that no man is condemned except on the


ground of his sin. "Also, that it is not to be regarded as teaching that any who die in infancy are lost. We believe that all dying in infancy are included in the election of grace and are regenerated and saved by Christ, through the Spirit, who works where and how he pleases."

Christ Heads Church. For section 6, chapter xxv., of the Confession of Faith the following is substituted:

"The Lord Jesus Christ is the only head of the church, and the claim of any man to be the vicar of Christ and the head of the church is unscriptural, Address Allen S. Olmsted, LeRoy, N. Y. without warrant in fact, and is a usurpation dishonoring to the Lord Jesus Christ."

At the conclusion of the reading of the report. Dr. Van Dyke spoke briefly upon the changes incorporated therein. His speech was one of the most impressive that has been delivered before the assembly, and was said by some of the commissioners to be one of the most notable ever made upon faith revision.

Has Simply Broadened. Dr. Van Dyke, who was frequently interrupted by applause from the commissioners, said he wished to make it clear to the assembly and especially did he wish to say to the brethren of the press, "that this revision does not mean that the Presbyterian church has changed her base


