It seems impossible for us to eradicate the tramp. The "hobo," like the poor, we in America seem always to have with us. No matter whether the times are good or bad the tramp is always tramping, or riding on bumpers of freight cars, and looking for a free living. The impression formerly prevailed that hard times made tramps, and that prosperity cured the country of the affliction, but as the New York Mail and Express remarks, "It is now a well admitted thing that prosperity is unable to cure the tramp evil, and hard times makes the evil worse." The cities especially the big cities, with their heterogeneous population, are the whirlpool rapids that in summer shoot out upon the rural communities hundreds of lazy, shiftless and vicious men, who do not even live by their wits, but are simply parasites upon those who toil for daily bread. The only remedy for this evil is to stop feeding the hobos. If an unfortunate asks you for a meal and is willing to work for it, charity should prompt you to give it to him. If he is not willing to work the best thing to do is to set the dog on him. Tramps are not in love with dogs.

Gen. J. S. Wilcox, in a talk about Kane county and Illinois, said: "Illinois was largely settled by people from the south on account of easy transportation by reason of the river. Chicago came near being in another state when the lines were run and Wisconsin narrowly escaped acquiring what became a great city. Had it not been for Chicago, with its perseverance of loyal citizens, Illinois would have taken sides with the south in the civil war. The balance of the state would not have kept her in. Kane county was named for Elias Kent Kane who was a United States senator when it was organized. He was a cousin of Dr. Kane, the Arctic explorer. It was organized by an act of the legislature, and three men rode for three days to secure signatures of 50 bona fide residents to a petition for this purpose. The territory at that time comprised part of what is now Kendall county and all of DuPage county. The county was organized in 1836. In 1833 Samuel McCarthy came from the south and purchased water power in what is now Aurora.

"No man with any regard for his reputation for sense and judgement," said Col. Henry Watterson in an interview recently, "would commit himself to any prediction of a presidential nomination twelve months in advance of the event." There is some truth in this as regards the democratic party, but it strikes us as rather sweeping when applied to the republicans at this time. Colonel Watterson is correct as regards the democratic nomination, but there few men but will concede that Roosevelt has a cinch on the republican nomination. In fact it is more than likely that there will be no opposition to him when the convention meets. It is a well known fact that the trusts will do all in their power to defeat him, but the rank and file of the party will unquestionably carry the day. If the democrats nominate a man like Cleveland, or Olney, there will be a genuine battle of the giants at next election, but from a close observation of the situation we are inclined to believe that Mr. Cleveland will not be a democratic standard bearer.

SYNOPSIS OF NEW GAME LAW.
That persons may readily understand the main points of the new game law which goes into effect July 1, next. State Game Commissioner Lorrey submits the following synopsis of the law, which is being sent out by County Game Warden G. W. Clark, Jr., of Wheaton:

You can hunt and kill quail with gun only between November 10 and December 30, of each year.
You must not kill any prairie chicken or grouse for the period of four years, from the 1st of July, 1903.
You must not net, trap or ensnare quail or prairie chicken at any time or under any circumstances.
You can kill woodcock and morning dove only between August 1 and December 1, of each year.
You can kill gray, red, fox or black squirrels only between July 1 and December 31, of each year.
You can kill all kinds of mink and marten only between September 1 and May 1, of each succeeding year.
You can kill wild geese, ducks and brant and other water fowl only between September 1 and April 15, of each succeeding year.
You must not kill wild geese, ducks, brant and other water fowl after sundown or before sunrise of each succeeding day.
You must not kill wild geese, ducks, brant or other fowl from any steam boat, rail boat, electric or gasoline launch or from any sink box or snook boat or artificial blind in the open waters of this state.
Blinds may be built on the shore, or in swamps, meads, willows, brush, wild rice or any other vegetation, but not out in the water.
You must not kill wild geese, ducks,

brant, quail, prairie chicken, grouse or squirrel for market or commercial purposes.

You must not sell or have in possession for the purpose of selling or transport for the purpose of sale, any wild geese, ducks, brant, quail, prairie chicken, grouse or squirrel that has been killed in the state of Illinois.
You must not at any time, kill more than fifty wild ducks, geese or brant, or more than twenty-five quail or game birds or any other game birds in one day.
You must not kill, expose or offer for sale or have in possession, except for breeding purposes, any wild buck, doe or fawn for a period of ten years from July 1, 1903.
You must not kill, expose or offer for sale or have in possession, except for breeding purposes, any wild turkey, pheasant or partridge of any kind for a period of five years from July 1, 1903.
Breeder can kill and sell cock pheasants between the 1st day of November and the 31st day of December, inclusive, of each year upon a permit issued to them by the state game commissioner.
You must not kill, catch or have in possession, living or dead, any wild bird, or part of bird, other than a game bird, except English sparrow or black bird or chicken hawk, and you must not purchase or expose such birds for sale.
You must not destroy or remove from the nests the eggs of any prairie chicken, grouse, quail, wild turkey, duck, goose, brant or song birds.
You can kill for commercial purposes and transport for sale or market all kinds of snipe, plover, mourning doves and rabbits.
You must not offer for sale or transport for the purpose of selling any snipe, plover or mourning doves after the expiration of five days succeeding the first day of the closed season nor can you sell the same during the first two days of the open season.

Inhabitants of villages and cities and dealers in game can receive game coming from other states, where it is lawful to kill and ship out of such states, and expose and sell on the market in said villages and cities such game between the 1st day of October and the first day of February of the following year.
All non-residents desiring to hunt and kill game in this state must take out a non-resident license and pay therefor \$15 per annum and also 50 cents to the clerk for issuing the same, the license to be secured from the clerk of each county.
All residents of the state who hunt game must take out a resident hunter's license and pay for the same \$1 per annum, and 10 cents to the clerk for issuing it; this license can be secured from the clerk of any village, city, town or county in the state.
All money received for licenses goes into the game protection fund, to be used to pay game wardens and their traveling expenses and all other expenses of the game department.
All licenses, whether residents or non-residents, expire on the 1st day of June, of each year.
All hunters, resident or non-resident, must have their hunting license with them at all times when hunting and be prepared to identify themselves as the person named in such license.
You must not use or attempt to use the license of another person or in any manner make any changes in any license for the purpose of transferring the same, under penalty of prosecution for forgery.
Owners of farm lands, their children or tenants can hunt and kill game on their own farm during the open season when it is lawful to kill game, without procuring such resident license, but they must not hunt beyond the lines of their own farm lands without a hunter's license.
You must not use any ferret at any time or under any circumstances for the hunting, capturing or killing any game animals or rabbits in this state.

For the purpose of enforcing the game and license laws there is a state game commissioner, ten game wardens for the state and one or more local game wardens for each county whose duty it shall be to see that all game laws are observed and to prosecute all persons who violate them.
