The members of the church and congregation are cordially invited. **BUMPER CROP OF WHEAT.** Nebraska's Harvest Will Yield Eighty Million Bushels of Golden Grain. CHICAGO, ILL., July 28.—Reliable estimates received at the general offices of the Burlington route indicate that Nebraska will have one of the largest wheat crops in history. In 1902 the yield was 60,216,670 bushels of which approximately 50,000,000 bushels was winter wheat, and the remainder spring wheat. This year it is believed that the crop will reach fully 80,000,000 bushels, nearly all winter wheat. The acreage is probably from 20 to 25 per cent greater than last year. Nebraska's developments as a winter wheat state can be shown by comparing the figures in recent years. In 1890 the yield was less than 10,000,000 bushels and practically all of that was spring wheat. In 1899 the yield was approximately 30,000,000 bushels and very evenly divided between spring and winter wheat. This splendid crop alone can sustain Nebraska's prosperity for another twelve months, to say nothing of the large yields of other staple products.
