Hinsdale Man Assaulted

Aged Wheaton Man Narrowly Escapes Death at Elgin.

DeKalb County Seat Fight Still Unsettled—Father Hagan, Prominent Churchman Dead—Other County News From Exchanges.

About 5 o'clock Monday afternoon a dastardly assault was made upon Mr. De Honstyn of Hinsdale, who is an old gentleman of 71 years, by Frank Wallace. It appears that Wallace, who has been living in De Honstyn's house, came home early in the afternoon and went to a small cottage near by, owned by Mr. De Honstyn, which Wallace intended to occupy as soon as some alterations were finished. Mr. De Honstyn was shingling the roof and Wallace went up to assist him. After a short time Wallace missed his hammer and accused the old gentleman of taking it. Some words followed and Wallace hit De Honstyn on the head with a hammer, making a severe scalp wound. It is said that Wallace was under the influence of liquor at the time. Wallace is a newcomer and has been employed in the composing room of Rand, McNally & Co. Officer Nicholson arrested him Tuesday, in the city, on a state warrant charged with assault with a deadly weapon. He was arranged before Justice Courter and held under \$4,000 bail for hearing Tuesday, at 4 p. m.

Mr. De Honstyn is under the care of Dr. Lawton and was resting easy at last report.

John Van Fleet, living at North Aurora, a wealthy farmer, tried to kill his wife Saturday by shooting her four times with a revolver. He then coolly left the house and the last seen of him he was walking over a hill into the woods back of his home. Jealousy is given as the cause for the deed. For several years Van Fleet and his wife have not lived happily, according to their two children, a boy and a girl, 9 and 7 years of age. Last week Mr. and Mrs. Van Fleet attended a carnival at St. Charles, and when they returned were quarrelling. This is thought to be the cause for the shooting. Three of the bullets passed through the abdomen and the other struck between the fingers of her left hand and ran along the arm, passing through the elbow. Neighbors speak well of Mr. Van Fleet and are surprised that he would commit such a deed. Saturday night the Aurora police and Sheriff Burke, with posse scoured the woods. It is thought by the police that Van Fleet will take his life. Mrs. Van Fleet died Sunday morning.

A. J. Butterfield, an aged resident of Wheaton, was run over and perhaps fatally injured by a Chicago & North Western train Saturday night. The catastrophe occurred at the DuPage street crossing while the train was passing through the city limits at the customary 15 mile an hour speed. Engineer Walters at once brought the train at a standstill and Drs. Berlingame and Sturm were hastily summoned. The injured man was taken to the police station and later to Sherman hospital where he is reported to be in a critical condition. His injuries include a severe scalp wound, a fractured shoulder, a broken rib, severe contusion of the liver, a broken ankle and numerous other cuts and bruises. Owing to his age which is 70 years, the physicians hold out small hopes for his recovery.

The DeKalb county seat fight was brought into court at Sycamore Monday. A motion for change of venue was overruled by Judge Pond on the grounds that a case of this nature would have to be tried in the county the fight was over. Attorneys McEwen and Morrison appeared for DeKalb, Jones and Carnes for Sycamore. Sycamore presented a petition signed by several hundred asking that their names be stricken off DeKalb's petition calling for a vote. The claim was made that many names on DeKalb's petition were fraudulent and experts made an examination, but no decision was reached. Sycamore claimed that the legal publication was defective, and that therefore the court could not call an election, an objection which Judge Pond took under advisement until tomorrow.

Rev. James M. Hagan died Sunday morning, August 23, at his home in LaGrange. He had been ill for some time, but his death came as a shock to the community, who mourn for him sincerely. Father Hagan was born Nov. 12, 1853, in Missouri, and was ordained to the priesthood July 5, 1880. He came to LaGrange in 1889 and established the church of St. Francis Xavier, over which he has presided ever since. His funeral was held from the pastoral residence Tuesday morning, and solemn pontifical requiem mass was celebrated the same morning at 10:30, in St. Francis Xavier's church, by Archbishop J. E. Quigley. His body was laid to rest in Mt. Carmel cemetery.
