Varying Occupations Have Much to

#### Non-Stinging Mosquito.

Dr. William Lyman Underwood, bacteriologist of the Boston board of health, has announced the discovery of a new species of mosquito twice as large as those that for ages have pestered humanity. The new creature is a non-stinging, non-biting member of the tribe and aids in destroying self. mosquitoes that do sting, its larvae feasting on the larvae of the pest. THE GROWTH OF PLANTS.

Proof That the Weather May Affect Their Propagation.

That a body can acquire, during the night, a different temperature from that of the surrounding atmosphere has been demonstrated by Mr. Well, an English physicist. If a thermometer is taken from the window, wrapped in cotton and placed on the ground its mercury will descend seven or eight degrees. Vegetables similarly situated, being bad conductors, may freeze at a time when the thermometer does not mark the freezing point-proof that the cold experienced by a plant may be entirely different from the temperature of the surrounding air. This low temperature of plants, however, only occurs when the night is clear, since at this time the plant sheds its heat throughout, space and becomes chilled, whereas, if the night is cloudy, the phenomenon does not occur. This gives rise to the popular superstition that plants and buds are frozen by moonlight.

#### Table Fruit Trees.

To eat fruit freah from the trees at a banqueting table is one of the latest luxuries of English epicures. Certain fruiters in the West-end of London are now making preparations for an abundant supply of dwarf fruit trees laden with cherries, peaches, pears and apples for ornament and dessert at the dinners of the coming season. The tiny fruit trees, which, although four or five years old, are only some 3 feet high, not only make a delightful table decoration, but produce a delicious dessert.

Army Emergency Ration. Every soldier in the British army carries in his haversack what is known as the "emergency ration." This consists of a small tin cylinder, into two compartments. One these is filled with four ounces of cocoa paste and the other contains a similar quantity of concentrated beef (pemmican). As its title implies, the ration is not to be used except in the case of direct necessity, and, if consumed in small quantities, it will main-

tain strength for thirty-six hours.

Magnetized Crops. Electricity, hitherto confined to the mechanical side of agriculture, has now to be classed among the fertilizers. Two Russian scientists, M. Spyeskneff and M. Krovkoff, have just perfected an electric battery specially designed for this purpose. It is buried in the soil, which thus becames magnetized, and not only makes the crop more forward, but more abundant. Excellent results are stated to have been obtained with potatoes, beetroot trefoil, barley and colza.
