ELINOIS AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

The special norm exhibit for Illinois a world's fair next year is expected semething of vast importance and in It will not be a mere corn show. he purpose is to show the world the efset of breeding corn with the same care he stockman employee in breeding cattle and to exhibit ourn of which the pedigree is as well known as that of the best fineblooded stock in the country.

All this and much more has been sleved in Illinois, and the result and of precedure are to be shown. The Illinois Corn Breeders' association will be one of the prime agencies in carrying out be plans. The exhibit will be of corn which is worth 82 per bushel wherever its value is properly understood. A bushel of this will plant seven acres which will viold at least five bushels an acre more than corn grown from seed selected from the best grown ordinary seed. These 35 bushels extra if called worth only 40c per hel represent a gain of \$14 on an inout of \$2, which is considered a very good rate of interest in Illinois, a rate which must attract the attention of corn growers in all the other states.

A splendid position for this special corn exhibit has been offered in the very center of the great agricultural building at the fair and it is proposed to adopt the following plan for getting the samples together: The Illinois commissioners will offer cash premiums at the time of the approaching annual meeting of the Illinois Farmer's Institute at Decatur for the best samples of padigree corn, in lots of 100 cars to three bushels, this to be judged and to belong to the state's commissioners for the exhi hit at the fair.

Electricity Works Two New Miracles

Literary Digest reports two new wonders that can be accomplished by electricity. It appears that a Munich engineer has discovered that if a current of electricity is sent through the ground it will drive out all the worms and insects that are hiding in the earth. If the current is strong it will kill them.

The discovery was made by accident. The engineer, Hugo Helberger, was allowing the electric current to run into the ground when he noticed scores of worms coming hurry-scurry out of the earth, as if they were being chased. On looking more closely at the ground he noticed that hundreds of smaller worms and insects were running for their lives away from the deadly current.

The other discovery has been made also by a German, an electrician of Darmstadt, Impossible as it may seem, he has succeeded in transforming air into fertilizing material. By means of a large electric "sparking machine" he mixes the nitrogen from the air with a substance made of lime and carbon.

So it is now possible to send an electric current through the soil and free the roots of plants from the worms, snails, beetles and other insects that are injurious to the plants. It is also possible to feed plants, vegetables, grain, etc., with food that is obtained from the air.

Both these miracles are accom plished by the same power that causes the lightning which has always been the farmer's terror. The electric current, which used to be known to the farmer only as an enemy, may now be used to free his land from insect pests and to enrich the soil.

Another wellknown man has gone so far as to have a beautifully carved sundial erected on the marble stone which covers his family burying-place. A handsom sundial was recently erected for the Duke of Sutherland in the gardens at Chorley Wood, Surrey.
