Owen, a physician and one of the most prominent men in Wheaton, died Safurday morning at the Chicago Homeopathic bospital from injuries sustained at the Iroquole fire. On Christmas day Dr. Owen held a family rounion; and eight relatives came from Ohio to spend the holiday week. Wednesday a theater party was arranged and twelve seats were secured at the Iroquois in the front row of the first twelve Dr. Owen was the only one to cape. The twelve victime are Dr. Charles S. Owen, Mrs. C S Owen, William Owen, Mrs S. A. Battenfield, John Battenfield, Robert Battenfield, Ruth Battenfield, Mrs. J. H' Dodd, Ruth Dodd, Charles Murray. Viola Kidwell, Sarah, a colored nurse. Dr. Owen probably held more offices in Whenton than any other man. He was alderman of the second ward, trustee and cretary of the Gary Memorial Methodist church, trustee of the Gary-Wheaton bank trustee and treasurer of the Adam Memorial Public library and superintendent the Wheaton fire company.
