Designed Many Useful Articles, but Never Patented by Them.

Not many people know that Thomas Jefferson was a great inventor. His inventions were all of articles of every-day use. He devised a three-legged folding camp stool that is the basis of all camp stools of that kind today. The stool he made for his own use was his constant companion on occasions of camp life. The revolving chair was his invention. He designed a light wagon. A copying press was devised by him and came into general use. He also invented an instrument for measuring the distance walked. A plow and a hemp reaper followed that his thoughts were often on agricultural matters. His plow received a gold medal in France in 1790. Jefferson never benefited financially by his inventions, but believed they should be for the use of every one without cost.

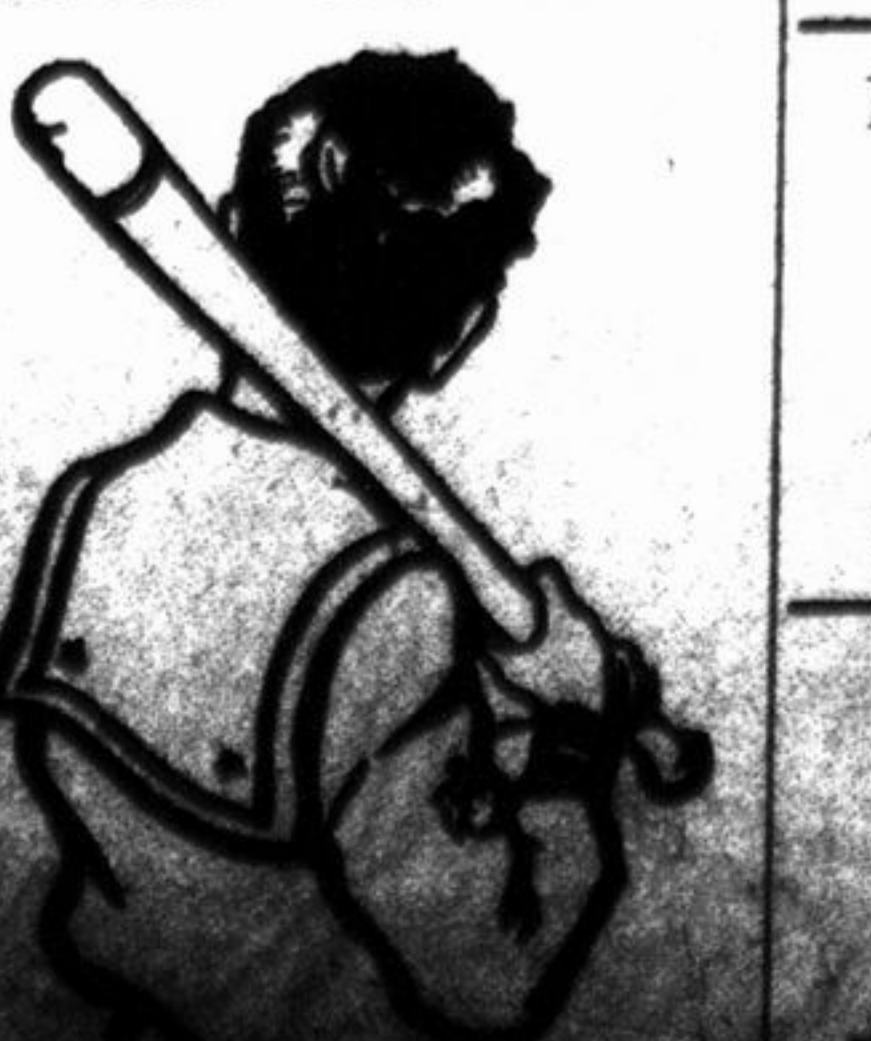
