Board Inspects Sewers.

Visits Sanitary Sewage Purification Plant at Wauwatosa, Wis.

Septic Tank and Filter Bed Systems to be Recommended for Downers Grove-Microbes do Work of Purification.

The separate system of sanitary sewers with septic tanks and filter beds for the purification of sewage will be recommended by the board of trustees as suitable for the needs of the village of Downers Grove. This has been decided upon since the board visited the sewage purification plants at Wauwatosa, Wis., fast Friday, where three sanitary sys perfect satisfaction.

President Mochel, Trustees J. W Hughes, J. W. Graves, C K. Roe, Geo. B. Heartt, C. H. Staats and Hugh M White of the REPORTER, made a thorough inspection of the three plants. Engineer W. S. leaving the septic tank; then it is spread over the top of an open filter 30 feet wide by 54 feet in length. This filter is built on a concrete floor and is eight feet deep composed of fine coal cinders and is covered with a frame building to protect it from the cold weather. The water after leaving this filter is bright and clear. It has been in constant operation since the first of February last and is giving results that are entirely satisfactory to the com-


