Placer Creeks Exist at the Head of White River, West of Tanana, and in Western Streams.

Tacoma, Wash., special: New gold discoveries prove the existence of a second gold zage traversing the British Yukon and Alaska and lying considerably southward of the first discovered zone, which crops out at Klondike, Koyukuk and Nome. The first strike in the new zone comprises the Tanana gold fields. Last summer rich new placers were found in the Alsek country west of White Horse. Reports are now being received of placer creeks in hitherto barren country at the head of White river, west of Tanana.

Gold has been discovered on the Susitina and other streams of western Alaska, while still other placers are being worked on Bristol bay.

The second gold zone apparently extends from near White Horse, at the head of Yukon navigation, along the northern foot hills of the McKinley mountain range and thence westward to Cook inlet and Bristol bay, a distance of 2,000 miles.

Court Decides Wisconsin May Arrest

Convict Let Out in Illinois. Milwaukee, Wis., special: Whether a prisoner on parole in Illinois under the parole law of that state is exempt from arrest by officers from another state was decided in the negative by Judge Brazee. The question came up in the plea in abatement made by Attorney W. J. Kershaw in behalf of J. E. Colgan, brought from Joliet to stand trial on a charge of forgery. The forgery is said to have been committed before Colgan went to Peoria, Ill., in 1901 and was convicted of a similar offense there and sentenced to Jollet for an indeterminate period. Last October the board of pardons let Colgan out on parole. The Milwaukee authorities then arrested him on the Wisconsin charge.

The longshoremen asked for 60 cents, an increase of 5 cents an hour over last year, but before the meeting came to a close they were willing to divide the difference and make the scale the same as last year.


