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# DeathofSarah A. Holland

Prominent Educator Succumbs Suddenly Monday Morning.

Death Due to Rupture of Blood Vessel in the Brain-Funeral Held from Residence Yesterday Afternoon at 2 O'clock.

Miss Sarah A. Holland, for more than fourteen years one of the prominent educators of Downers Grove, died suddenly at her home in this village Monday, Feb. 29, aged 41 years, 11 months.

The sudden termination of a life which has meant so much to the rising generations of Downers Grove has been a distinct shock to those who have felt the influence of her personality, and has brought keenest grief to her many true friends, young and old.

Through continuous and devoted at tention to her duties here for the previous fourteen years, her health became affected to such an extent that she wa reluctantly forced to take a vacation of several months, at the end of which time, not being sufficiently recovered to resume her duties, the Board of Ed ucation magnanimously granted her s further vacation of a year. Careful and systematic treatment and rest re suited in a practical restoration to health, which continued with little interruption until about six weeks ago when an attack of the grip prostrated her quite decidedly. Her improvement while slow was quite satisfactory, un til Saturday the 20th inst., when, after a restless period of several days, she fell into a sleep from which she never aroused, a blood vessel having ruptured in the brain, resulting in her death at 6:15 o'clock Monday morning.

Funeral services were held at the family residence Wednesday afternoon, March 2, at two o'clock. Rev. Herbert H. Rood and Rev. H. Booth Hazen officiated. Hundreds of sorrowing friends attended to pay a last tribute of love to the memory of one universally respected. The schools were closed in her honor and the board of education and teachers attended in a body, as well as many of her former pupils. Many floral emblems, tokens of love from the board, teachers, pupils and friends covered the casket, mute but sloquent symbols of the esteem in which she was held. Burial was at the West cemetery.

Sarah A. Holland was the eldest child and only daughter of John and Sarah Holland, and was born at Rochdale, England, March 29th, 1862. She came with her parents to Downers Grove in March, 1870, and has since re sided here in the same location, corner Maple avenue and Carpenter street. She attended the village schools and graduated therefrom with honors in Nhe fitted herself for educational at Cass where she was engaged one don Hills and one year at Wheaton. Since 1888 she has been engaged continuously in the schools of Downers Grove, having been principal in the old south side building for several years.

Miss Holland's ability as an educator was marked and many of Downers Grove's young men and women owe their success in life to their early careful training under her tutorage. Pos sessing a strong character with lofty ideals and pure motives, she has le the impress of true womanhood as a example for rising generations to emu-

In addition to her parents she leaves four brothers, Dr. W. E Holland David L. Holland of Downers Grove, and John Henry Holland of England, to mourn her loss.

ST. ANDREWS CHURCH CONSECRATED. Dedicatory Services Conducted by Bishop Co-

adjutor Anderson Sunday Morning.

A very impressive ceremony took place at St. Andrew's church on Sunday last. The church, being entirely free from debt, was solemnly consecrated and dedicated to the honor and worship of Almighty God,

The service was at 10 80 a. m. and the consecrator was the Right Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson, bishop coadjutor of the diocese of Chicago, assisted by Rev. H. E. Chase, priest in charge of St; Andrew's church.

The bishop was met at the entrance

by the committee, who admitted him and with the choir proceeded up the aisle, repeating the twenty-fourth psalm. When the bishop was seated the instrument of donation was read by the clerk of the committee. This was followed by an exhortation and prayers and then the sentence of consecration was read by the priest in charge and laid upon the altar, after which the regular order of morning prayer was said and a sermon by the bishop. The service ended with a celebration of the Holy Communion, Bishop Anderson being the celebrant. The body came to the surface 28 miles from the neighborhood where Elick disappeared. An examination revealed long gash over the left eye. A front tooth had been broken off, the uniform coat removed and most of the money which Elick is known to have had in his possession, taken from the pockets These circumstances led the railroad officials to believe that Elick was struck down and robbed and that his body was thrown into the canal by his assailants. It is thought that the crime was committed as the stock train of which Elick was in charge was approaching the six-track bridge near Campbell avenue. Elick was seen to leave the caboose, but when the cars were stopped at Campbell avenue he could not be found. So mysterious were the features of the case that the company of fered a reward of \$500 for the recovery of Elick's body. His home was in West Chicago.
