BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PROCEEDINGS.

Proceedings of the board of supervisors of DuPage county at an adjourned meeting held at the court house in Wheaton on Friday, April 1, 1904. Meeting called to order with Supervisor Betts presiding.

The following report of the grand jury was read and ordered of record: The grand jury having completed its labor beg to submit the following report: We have heard the witnesses to complaints in 16 cases and have found 12 true bills and 4 no bills.

Our inspection of the county farm shows conclusively that the affairs of that institution are conducted in a businesslike manner, the farm and buildings are in a good sanitary condition and the care of the inmates reflects credit on the present management of that institution.

We note the new vegetable building, just finished, will be a valuable acquisition to the farm and county house.

Your grazing jurors feel that it would not be inappropriate to express, as they now do, their high appreciation of the services of Hon. M. Blanner, state's attorney, his uniform courtesy and manifest ability to respond promptly to any and all demands made upon him make him a public servant worthy of commendation, and therefore we take pleasure in spreading upon the records this mark of our approval.

The following resolution, passed March 21, 1904, by the Walter Blanchard post, G. A. R., was read, and was ordered of record: Whereas, the board of supervisors of DuPage county, has set apart a room for the use of soldiers and sailors and the walls of the court house, containing the names of the soldiers and sailors of the civil war, 1861 to 1865, residents of DuPage county, therefore, be it

Resolved, that this Post tender the supervisors their sincere thanks for the generosity and patriotism displayed by them in thus perpetuating the memories of our dead and living comrades, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the board of supervisors by the Adjutant of this post.

On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt the board took a recess to 2 p. m.

On returning for afternoon session, committee on claims made the following report, which on motion of Supervisor Bender, was approved.

The bill of Lewis Bluh, of \$24 15, for justice and constable fees we refer to the full board.

The claim of Lewis Rich, for justice and constable fees that was referred to the full board, was on motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt allowed on last two counts for \$18.85.

The following report of committee on fees and salaries was approved: Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors: Your committee on fees and salaries beg to report that they have examined all claims presented and recommend the payment of the following:

The following report of committee on county farm was approved: To the Honorable chairman and board of supervisors of DuPage county: Your committee on county farm most respectfully report that on the 9th day of March, your committee called on the Wolf Mfg. Co., the Featherstone Mfg. Co., and the Illinois Creamery Mfg. Co., to obtain prices and purchase a refrigerator plant, to be installed at the county farm, and your committee on that day purchased a refrigerator plant for \$1,251 of the Illinois Creamery Mfg. Co., to be by them installed as per plans and specifications herewith submitted, the county providing space, water, steam and connections and one helper. Your committee also on the 24th day of March purchased an 8 horse power engine for \$100 with which to operate said plant. The estimated cost of shaftings, pulleys and connections is \$64.

Your committee believe that the plant, when completed, will be one of the most complete of its kind.

Your committee would further report that the sheep have been shorn and the wool shipped to Chicago, and that the sheep are in fine condition. We have at the present time from 180 to 200 lambs that are doing well, considering the weather and unfavorable conditions that have prevailed. Also that they have a surplus of fine hogs of our own raising that will be ready for the market in about five or six weeks.

On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt the clerk was instructed to draw county orders for the per diem and mileage of the respective supervisors for their services for the year last past.

The following resolution presented by Supervisor Bartlett was on his motion unanimously adopted: Whereas, this board is about to adjourn sine die, and whereas, Adam W. Kohley and Jacob E. Bender, members of this board, have declined to accept the nomination to succeed themselves as supervisors of the respective townships, therefore be it resolved, that we hereby spread upon the records of this county our testimony of the valued services rendered by said retiring members, and that we regret that we shall not have the pleasure of their presence and counsel at the future meetings of this board. Be it further resolved, that we hereby extend a vote of thanks to our honorable chairman, Thos. Betts, for the fair and impartial manner in which he has presided at our meetings during the past year.

On motion of Supervisor Bartlett the board adjourned sine die.
