

UNCLE SAND OLD EMPLOYES.

Congressman Gillett's committee on reform in the civil service held another interesting hearing to-day, says a Washington dispatch, at which Brig. Gou. F. C. Alneworth, chief of the record and pension office in the war department, gave a forceful statement of his ideas, as the result of years of experience. Gen. Ainsworth favored security of tenure in office for government employes and a retirement system making it obligatory for employes to retire at the end of a long specified term of service, or after reaching a certain age. He said that until the civil service was placed on a similar basis to the war and navy departments, thus ridding the service of the dead wood, effective and economical service could not be expected. He would have a general merit system in every branch of the service, by which clerks would be rated, and would by this means eliminate all possibility of political influence in securing promotions for clerks. If the clerks were given the right to retire at a certain time on half or three-

fourths pay, they would devote their whole interest to doing good work, and not be dividing their interests in seeking employment outside by which to earn provision for old age. Gen. Ainsworth stated that the estimated cost of a retired list in the civil service, the age of retirement being placed at 64 years, as in the army, would be, on a three-fourths pay basis, 10.19 per cent of the active list. If retired at 64 on half-pay, the cost would be 6.75 per cent of the active deceased, will, on the 7th day of May, 1904, at Entire Building of 8 Floors list. She was going to get off as soon as the car stopped. A runaway, driverless horse and wagon came along, rushing straight for the car. The conductor ran inside and warned the passengers, who started in a panic for the front door. The woman was dazed with fear. Harry Meyers had plenty of time to escape and let the woman and baby be killed. Just as the crazy horse was coming on the car Harry Meyers threw himself in front of the woman and child. One of the shafts ran through his thigh. The woman took another car. It did not occur to her to thank the boy who had saved two lives. Harry Meyers was taken to the hospital; "condition serious."

Lord Augustus Loftus, whose death is announced from London at the age of 87, had spent his active life of fifty rears, from 1835, in the diplomatic service and was an attache of Sir Stratford Canning's special mission at Berlin, Vienna, Munich and Athens in 1848. He was later minister at each of these posts, ambassador to the court of Prussia in 1862, to the north German confederation in 1868. at St. Petersburg from 1871 to 1879 and was for six years governor of New South Wales. He retired with many honors, though with no special distinction, in 1886.

Home for Yale President. By the death of Mrs. Henry Farnam, who passed away not long ago, Yale will receive a permanent home for its president. According to the terms of the will of the late Henry Farnam, his handsome residence in New Haven is to go to the university upon the death of his widow and his son, Prof. Henry W. Farnam, to be used as the home of the president. The home is filled with art treasures which will also pass to the university. The gift is valued at \$250,000.


