Miss Graves read a paper on drawing in the forences. She said in part: The term drawing very inadequately expresses the nature of the study it is desirable to have taught in our schools under that name. Drawing is only a feature in the important study of form, while in the application of form knowledge, it becomes the principal means of expressing thought. It is the foundation for all industrial education and an indispensible aid to almost ev ery subject now taught in the schools. Learning to draw well is learning to see correctly. Drawing is of great benefit to all, physically, intellectually and withstically, and should be regarded as a means and not as an end. The necessity for concentration builds up character, and teaches the unthinking to think. What does more for a child than the study of drawing? It developes and cultivates observation, Downers Grove furnishes the majority preseverance, patience, individuality, reason, judgement, skill, ingenuity, self-reliance, power of concentration, appreciation of the beautiful, and there is an elevating effect on character in the desire to express the beautiful.
