REPUBLICAN NOMINEE FOR GOVERNOR

HUGH M. WHITE.

Charles S. Deneen of Chicago was nominated for governor of Illinois by the re publican state convention on the seventyminth ballot Friday afternoon, and the phenomenal struggle that since May 12 ly retarded. had kept 1,500 delegates in the most remarkable deadlock in the history of the country reached a dramatic conclusion.

The Lowden delegates remained solid for their candidate to the end, but when the count showing Deneen had received 957 votes, Lowden 522, Warner 21 and Tates 1-was announced the nomination was made unanimous on the motion of Colonel Lowden himself.

The choice of Mr. Deneen was made posible by the self-effacement of three sandidates - Governor Richard Yates. Howland J. Hamlin and Lawrence Y. Sherman-who abandoned their claims and awang their followers to the Chicago man in recognition of the fact that the time had come for personal sacrifice. The three renunciations were accomplished with earnest appeals that the choice of Chicago and Cook county should be chosen to head the ticket, and Deneen was nomnated on a single poll.

The successive storms were attended by high winds and much fruit was it. For what is a man advantaged if blown off. Corn planting and plowing were greatly hindered, the soil being too sodden to work. Well distributed and beneficial showers fell in the central and northern districts, of heavy measurements in some instances, and while they contributed to plant growth field work was great-

The temperature was below normal the first part and above the latter part of the week; the mean was about normal. Maxima of 90 degrees were recorded in the northern district toward the end of the

Corn, in the central and northern districts, is practically all in the ground, and many fields are showing a good stand Much cultivating has been done and the erop is generally clean. On account o poor seed and the ravages of cutworm much replanting has been rendered neces sary. In the southern district much planting remains to be done.

Oats are growing under favorable con ditions and the crop has made marked advance during the week. Rye is heading out and is genearlly promising.

Some correspondents report that wheat is heading low, but the average condition continues favorable and the outlook has improved during the week.

The weather conditions have been far orable for graeses; clover is in bloom. Re ports indicate that many clever fields were winter-killed. A large acreage will be planted to broom corn.

Potatoes are promising generally, except in the southern district, where much re planting was entailed on account of seed

Blackberries and raspberries are in bloom. Strawberries are ripe and a heavy gield is promised. Apples in the northern district are still promising, but in the central and southern districts, the principal region of production, numerous adverse reports are being received. The fruit is dropping at a rapid rate, the causes ascribed being blight, macca


