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NEW PERIL IN WARFARE.

Submarine Torpedo Boat Sinks a Tug by Ramming.

While the French submarine boat Narval was leaving Cherbourg harbor recently she came into collision with a tugboat which was traveling at right angles to the course of the submarine.

The officer of the latter observed the approaching tug, and immediately reversed his engines. The Narval was at the time making a speed of five knots. Although the momentum of the submarine was thus considerably reduced, she struck the tugboat with sufficient force amidsthips to force her nose through the hull of the latter to the extent of sixteen inches, and the tug ultimately foundered, when the nose of the Narval was withdrawn.

This accident affords a conclusive estimate of the strength and power of these submarine craft for ramming purposes, when driven at full force against another craft and, according to French admiralty experts, opens new possibilities concerning naval tactics.
