The report of the assistant adjutant general of the Illinois Grand Army at the encampment at Springfield shows a membership on Jan. 1, 1904, of 20,519. On Jan. 1, 1903, it was 21,025, being a net loss of members for the year 1903 of 560, as against 700 in the preceding year The net loss in the number of posts in each year was to. One post, in each of these years, was gained by organization and muster, and one by reinstatement.

The number of posts in good standing Jan. 1, 1904, was 543. The death loss in 1902 was 713; in 1903 it was 753. comparison of the two past years indicates that the gains by muster, transfer and reinstatement are about equal to the losses of honorable discharge, transfer and suspension.
