Hon. W. W. Sedgwick Dead After a lingering illness, Hon. W. W. home of G. K. Wright. Since leaving Sedgwick, long a leading citizen of Sandwich, passed away on Saturday, July 9, 1904. He had been in failing health for years, but his last and fatal illness dates time. He was en route for the St. Louis from Saturday night, June 25, two weeks before his death, when he was stricken with paralysis, after which his decline was steady and rapid. Deceased was born in Oneida county, N. Y., June 1827. He studied medicine, was graduated at Rush Medical college as a physician in 1848, and engaged in practice with his father until the latter's death. In 1857 he removed to Sandwich with his family.
