Remains of Mastedon Found

The skeleton of a mastodon was recently found on a farm in the southeast part of Kendall county, near Minooka, by John L. Bamford. A few feet below the surface were found some large bones, which were proved to be those of a mastodon. One of the tusks measured nine feet in length. Evidently many animals of different kinds had fallen and given up their lives in the mire about the spring, for there were found a variety of skeletons. As they dug deeper the water came in such volume that it was impossible, with a common pump, to excavate and remove the entire skeleton, and it was abandoned for a while.
