### The War in the East

Mrs. Shaw of Highland avenue has received from her daughter, Mabel who is a missionary in China, a clipping from an Anglo Chinese paper published in Shanghai, which in a fabled manner very cleverely discribes the Russo-Japanese war. Russia is pictured as 'a "boy, who has a large garden, very rough and uncultivated, and is always trying to steal bits of the garden of the other boys when the soil is better and more productive." The Chinese boy's garden is "big and productive but he is lazy" and the Russian boy "has taken part of it and wants more." The Corean boy is lazier yet and has a very small plot, but the "Japanese boy is a very active, energetic, bright little fellow, very clever with his fists, always in good training and not disposed to be put up even by the bigest boy in the school." The story opening of the conflict between the two boys representing Russia and Japan and affixed is the following comment:
