Having Fun Over Burglary

The Hinsdale Herald tried to out do the Chicago papers in their burlesque news report on the robbery of Mertz & Mochel's store last week. The Herald says: "The only cool man in the village was the town marshal, who hurriedly summoned a posse of our bravest men. The burglars were corralled in the building and a cordon formed around it. Every man was 'armed to the teeth' with weapons, from Captain Rogers' old flint lock (which they borrowed) to a toy pistol. When the officer had his men

The acts of bravery of the different members of the brave posse are discussed to this day."
