Of course the merchants are so accustomed to your going to Chicago for your principal purchases that they don't mind it and make very little effort to turn the tide of trade their way. It will not always be so. Some day some man will declare that your trade belongs to him because his stock of merchandise is in your town, and he will get it. He will get it because he deserves it and is worthy of it.

AFTER the enormous majority governor Deneen received in Chicago, mayor Harrison announced his determination not to be a candidate for mayor again. Any fair-minded citizen will concede that a great improvement has taken place in the management of municipal affairs in Chicago since the day Carter Harrison was first elected.

Death of J. Holdeback
John Holdeback died at his home in Downers Grove early Christmas morning of acute heart failure. The deceased was a native of Germany, born on May 30, 1829. In 1850 he was united in marriage with Maria Weston, and to this union were born five children, three of them dying in infancy. In 1869 Mr. Holdeback came to America, settling in Downers Grove, and has been an esteemed resident of this village ever since. He was an active member of the Evangelical church having joined that church soon after coming to America, and has held prominent offices during his life in church work. He leaves to mourn his loss, one daughter, Mrs. Henry Pils, of La Grange, Illinois, one son, H. C. Holdeback, of Downers Grove, ten grand-children, and five brothers, also a host of friends and neighbors who have learned to esteem his exemplary christian life, and his kind disposition. Funeral services were held at 10:30 A. M. December 27, at the Evangelical church and interment was made at West Side cemetery where the deceased's wife is buried.

Bees Are Private Property
It is a common belief that the stray swarms of bees belong to the man who discovers them and that he may enter upon the premises of other parties and take possession of them. It is also believed that the finding of a bee tree gives the right to cut down such a tree and take the honey no matter upon whose land it may be found. The Supreme court of Iowa has rendered a decision to the effect that the bees are not like wild animals, since they have local residences at times and belong to the person on whose property they have stored their honey. The forest as well as the cultivated field belongs to the owner thereof, and he who invades it is a trespasser.

Death of Mrs. G. O. Bartlett
On Saturday December 21, Mrs. G. O. Bartlett passed away at the home of her daughter Mrs. Andrus, of this village, being in her ninety third year. Mrs. Bartlett was born at Palmer, Massachusetts, July 7, 1812. Her maiden name was Jerusha C. Bacon. She was married to Harrison G. O. Bartlett May 27, 1814. She was the youngest of a family of ten children, nine of whom attained to mature years. She took the first trip made on the first railroad built between Boston and Worcester, and was among those who saw Lafayette when on his last visit to this country. The family moved to Illinois in June, 1852. She was the mother of five children. Three sons and one daughter survive her. Mrs. L. M. Andrus of this village, George H. Bartlett, of Bonnewell, Kentucky; John H. Bartlett, of Fitzgerald, Georgia; Henry W. Bartlett, of Vancouver, British Columbia. The last named had just paid his mother a visit, a few days ago. Mrs. Bartlett's husband died January 20, 1892, in Lockport, Illinois. The last thirteen years of her life she has spent with her daughter, Mrs. Andrus of this village. She was a cheerful and lovable companion, and will be sorely missed. Early in life she united with the Presbyterian church. The funeral services were conducted at the home of her daughter on Tuesday afternoon, by Rev. F. F. Farmiloe, who paid a tender tribute to her memory, and referred to the coincidence that the first marriage ceremony of his pastorate and the first funeral service were conducted in the same home. The remains were interred in Fairview cemetery, at Cass.
