Imperfect Sewer System Wheaton Illinoian says: The heavy rainfall of last week again demonstrated the fact that there is something wrong with Wheaton's drainage system. Cellars in the third ward were flooded and there is much dissatisfaction expressed, as the taxpayers think they paid for something they did not get. We are informed that the 33-inch tile stands almost full of water at the outlet in dry times. The ditch was cleaned out for a mile below the septic tank last year, which worked well until the sides of the ditch caved in, What is needed is something per-

A plan is now being considered to put an 8-inch cement half circle in the ditch, which would make a free waterway. By going a mile west and digging back to the septic tank, the outlet could be made level with the bottom of the tile. With a cement waterway the improvement would be permanent. With a proper outlet the present drainage tile would be empty instead of full The tiles are filling up with dirt because of an obstructed outlet.

The cost of a cemented ditch for mile would be about four thousand dollars. The residents who are suffering the inconveniences of the present arrangement should be relieved.

Amending Section 1 and Section 1A of Chapter XV of the Revised General ordinances of the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois, as revised and passed by the President and Board of Trustees of said village on March 2nd, A. D. 1903.

He it ordained by the President and Board of Trusters of the Village of Downers tiruve. Du Page County, Hilnois. Section 1. That Section 1 and Section 1A. Chapter Fifteen (15) of the Revised General Ordinances of the Village of Downers tiruve, Im Page County, Illinois, be amended as as to read as follows Section 1. No person, either as principal

agent, clerk or servant shall, within the corporate limits of said Village, sell, give away or otherwise distribute any fermented elder, hard elder, ale, porter, heer, wine, rum, brands, gla, whisky, bitters or other in toxicating liquor in any quantity to be used as a beverage, re-sold or distributed, except that the holder of license, as provided in Section 1A of this chapter, may lawfully sell mait liquors only in quantities of not less than one (1) gallon at any time, proage in any quantity shall be made to be drank on the premises where sold, nor in or upon any place or premises adjacent thereto, nor to a person who is in the habit of getting intoxicated, nor to a minor, nor on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday; and, provided further, that sales, delivery or distribution shall only be made between the hours of Six o'clock A. M and Eight o'clock P. M., nor shall de-Hvery be made to any person or persons excepting at his or their residence or regularly established place of business, and upon premises where sold; nor shall any one he entirled to sell from, nor conduct, operate, or maintain more than one place of bust ness for that purpose under one license; and each place of business to be located and | Bush & Simonson, cor. Main St. tramed, or any other person, or persons, shall not deposit or throw upon any street, alley, or other public grounds, or upon any lot, block, tract, or parcel of land, other than their own, within the said VIIlage, any empty liquor fottles of any description, or any empty hear cases, or boxes, and it is hereby made the duty of all persons to whom a license is granted under the provisions of this ordinance to pick up and remove all such empty bottles, cases, and boxes, promptly wherever found within the limits of said Village; and, provided further, that the vehicles with which delivery or distribution is made shall be lettered so as to indicate the business carried

on with said vehicles. Section 4A. The President of the Village of Downers Grove shall, from time to time, grant license for the sale of mait liquors only, in quantities of not less than one gallon at a time to any one person, who shall apply to him in writing, upon such person furnishing sufficient evidence to satafy said President, and the License Committee shall report favorably as to the character of the applicant to the President, and upon such person paying to the Collector of said Village in advance the license fee hereinafter provided, and executing to the people of the State of Illinois a bond, with at least two sureties, to be approved by said President, for the amount required and provided by Section Five (3) of Chanter 43 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Illinois, and conditioned that the licensee shall keep and observe all of the laws and ordinances of said Village, and particularly the ordinances thereof in relarion to intexleating lienters. Every license so granted shall be for the uniform rate of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000,00) per annum and shall expire with the Municipal rear in which the same shall be granted. and the rate for any fractional part of the year shall not be less than One Thousand

The license herein provided shall be signed by the President of said Village, and countersigned by the Village Clerk, and the Seal of the Village shall be affixed. Section 2. This ordinance shall be force from and after its passage and approval and legal publication. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflicwith this ordinance are hereby repealed. Passed May 1, A.
