

A Local Inventor

C. Ford Davis has invented an asparagus cutter and buncher that no doubt will be a great labor saver to those who grow asparagus for the market. Instead of the old way of going along in a half stooped attitude and making two chops at a stalk to cut the shoot and demolish the refuse stalk, the new machine allows the operator to stand erect, and by means of a trigger on a handle operate a knife that cuts the shoot and then another trigger is released and it is thrown into a "buncher," the unused stalk being clipped off close to the ground and allowed to die. Mr. Davis has worked on his model for nearly three years and now has a patent on it. He has tried it and it works well.

ELECTRIC LINE TO CHICAGO

The following from the Aurora Beacon indicates that the Aurora, Elgin & Chicago electric line, the Wolfe road, may have a competing line in the near future. The Dolph-Morton lines recently won a fight for right-of-way through Aurora, and is heavily financed;

"That an Aurora-Chicago line will be constructed has been definitely decided by the Dolph-Morton people. While awaiting the decision of the Supreme court in the Galena street condemnation cases, Mr. Dolph and his assistants are at work on the course of the proposed line.

"A number of plans are being considered, but the most feasible is to follow the line of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy. By this course the line will pass through Eqla, Naperville, Downers Grove, Clarendon Hills, Hinsdale, Western Springs, La Grange, Grossdale and Riverside.

"The line will connect with the Pigeon Hill line of the Aurora railway's company at Pierce street, and will gain entrance into Chicago over the lines of the La Grange-Chicago suburban line. Later this plan may be abandoned and a terminal of their own in the heart of the city be sought.

"Mr. Dolph, when seen to-day by a reporter for The Beacon, said: 'Yes, it is true that line to Chicago has been definitely decided upon. The plan that seems most probable is to follow the line of the "Q." This takes us through some of the best Chicago suburbs. No effort has yet been made to secure the right of way, but a survey will be made soon."

"The line will mean much to Aurora. It will connect this city with Eola and Naperville as the other electric lines have connected the city with Batavia, Geneva, St. Charles, Oswego and Yorkville. An electric line would add the residents of Eota and Naperville to Aurora's list of shoppers.

"The company believes that much traffic will be gained between Downers Grove, Clarendon, Hinsdale, Western Springs and Grossdale. The La Grange electric line runs only to La Grunge, and the people of the towns farther out want an extension and have circulated petitions for such at numerous times."
