



# THE WANING HARDWOOD SUP-

Although the demand for hardwood imuber is greater than ever before, the amount cut to-day is a billion feet less than it was seven years ago. In this time the wholesale price of the different classes of hardwood lumber has advanced from 25 to 65 per cent. The cut of oak, which in 1899 was more than half the total cut of hardwoods, has fallen off 36 per cent. Yellow poplar, which was formerly second in point of output, has fallen off 38 per

sent and olm has fallen off one-half. The cut of softwoods is over four times that of hardwoods, yet it is doubtful if a shortage in the former would cause dismay in so many industries. The cooperage, furniture, and vehicle industries depend upon hardwood timber, and the railroads, teletone and telegraph companies, agricultural implement manufacturers and differs use it extensively.

This leads to the question, Where is the future supply of hardwoods to be found? The cut in Ohio and Indiana, which, seven years ago, led all other States, has fallen off one-half. Illinois. lows, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, Tennessee, Texas. West Virginia and Wisconsin have also declined in hardwood production. The chief centers of production now lie in the Lake States, the lower Mississippi Valley, and the Appalachian Mountains. Yet in the Lake States the presence of hardwoods is an almost certain indication of rich agricultural land, and when the hardwoods are cut the land is turned permanently to agricultural use. In Arkansas, Louistana, and Mississippi the production of hardwoods is clearly at its extreme beight, and in Missouri and Texas it has already begun to decline.

The answer to the question, therechian Mountains. They contain the largest body of hardwood timber left in the United States. On them grow the greatest variety of tree species anywhere to be found. Protected from fire and reckless cutting, they produce the best kinds of timber, since their soil and climate combine to make heavy stands and rapid growth. Yet much of the Appalachian forest has been so damaged in the past that it will be years before it will again reach a high state of productiveness. Twenty bil-Hom fost of hardwoods would be a conservative estimate of the annual productive especity of the 75,000,000 acres of forest lands in the Appalachians if they were rightly managed. Until they are we can expect a shortage in ardwood timber.

# AN ORDINANCE

Providing for the Connection of Private and Other Property With the Public Sewers.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois.

Section 1. That any person or persons. occupying, owning, or having any interest in any lot, ground, building, dwelling, store, louse, shed, barn, or any other structure in the Village of Downers Grove, the same being located within one thousand feet of, and above the grade of the sanitary sewers of said Village of Downers Grove, shall not discharge any sewage from any premises into or upon any highway, stream, water course, or public place, or into any barn, cess pool or private sewer, or into any private property or grounds, in the Illage of Downers Grave, on or after April 15th A. D. 1908, but shall connect their premises with the sanitary sewers of said

illage on or before said date. Sec. 2. Any person violating the first section of this ordinance shall be subject to fine of ten dollars, and to a like penalty for every week he shall continue to violate the first section of this ordinance, after the first conviction.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication. All ordinances or parts of or-dinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. Passed, this 14th day of October, A. D.

# AN ORDINANCE

Relating to the Rights of Railreads in the Streets and Alleys in the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois.

Be it ordained by the President and Board Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois. Section 1. All railroad companies and

the owners of any railroad lying within the limits of the Village of Downers Grove, fore, would seem to lie in the Appala- are hereby forbidden to lay any tracks, upon the streets, alleys and public grounds of the Village of Downers Grove without the permission of the Board of Trustees of the said Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois, being first obtained for the laying of such tracks, sidings, sidetracks, switches or switch-tracks.

Sec. 2. Any ratiroad company, ratiroad corporation or owners of any railroad who shall by themselves, their agents or emplorees violate the provisions of this ordibance, or any agent or employe of any railroad company or railroad corporation or owners of any railroad in the Village of Downers Grove, who shall violate the same shall, for each violation, be fined in a sum of not less than twenty five dollars nor exceeding two hundred dollars, to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction. The Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove shall and is hereby authorized to immediately remove such tracks, sidings, sidetracks, switches, or switch tracks as may be laid in violation of this ordinance. Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect in ten days from and after its passage and due publication accord

The Village Collector shall issue no permits for the removal of any building into, nor from one location to another. within the fire limits without a special order or resolution of the Board of Trustees of said Village, authorizing the Issuing of such permit; provided, that nothing in this section shall apply to the removal of a building from one part or portion of lot to another part or portion of the same lot (except when the same is situated within the fire limits of said Village). where such building is not to be moved over or across any premises except those of the owner or proprietor of such building, nor over or across any street, alley or other public place. Sec. 5. The permit fee to be paid to

It shall be unlawful for any housemover or other person to drive from stakes in any brick, stune or other pavement within the Village of Downers Grove, under a penalty of not exceeding one bundred dollars for each offense, and a forfeiture of any license as housemover the person convicted may hold, and for such forfeiture shall be entered up as a part of the penalty upon any such conviction. # AN ORDINANCE

Sidewalk Ordinance No. 144.

An Ordinance for the Building of a Cement Sidewaik in the Village of Downers Grove.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trastees of the Village of Downers Grove,

Du Page County, Illinois. Section 1. That a coment aldewalk four feet and eight inches in width be constructed on the west side of Prince avenue, in the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page to manage the general interests of the Club good buildings. Inquire at Reporter of following described lots and parcels of land,

Lot 7 of Block 9 of E. H. Prince & Company addition to the Village of Downers Grove, Du Page County, Illinois. Sec. 2. That said aldewalk shall be con-

structed and the cost thereof collected in all respects in accordance with the provislons of an ordinance of said Village passed by the President and Board of Trustees said Village on the 224 day of June, A. D. 1903, approved on the 22d day of June, A. D. 1903, and duly published, as provided by law, on the 25th day of June, A. D. 1903, and now in full force and effect in said Village, which said ordinance is by reference hereby made a part of this ordinance as fully as if the provisions thereof were set forth herein at large.

That said sidewalk shall be constructed of the materials and according to the provisions of Section One of the aforesaid ordinance passed on the 22d day of June. 1903, as aforesald.

Upon the taking effect of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to immediately fix the grade for said sidewalk as required by said general ordinance, and fix and specify said grade in such manner that the owner or owners of the lots and lands abutting upon said sidewalk may be able to build said stiewalk in accordance with the grade so fixed. Upon the taking effect of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the Street Commissloper of said Village to give to the several owners of the lands and lots abutting upon said proposed sidewalk, or their agents if known, notice in writing, which said notice shall state that said sidewalk may be con-structed by the owners within 20 days from the date of publication of the said ordinance, and to said notice shall be attached a copy of this ordinance and a copy of said Sec. 4. It is hoped that there will be no misunderstanding with regard to the object of the club. The idea is to provide a clean, decent and orderly place with home advantages for young men who have no home in the village and feel its need, and for young men who like to meet their companions (young men) and spend a social hour with them. It is not always easy to do this, even in the best regulated and most persist ent homes. About fifty young men have already consented to unite with the club, and it is hoped that the membership will reach one hundred.

There will be a large assortment of magazines, daily papers, books, games, etc., etc.

Photography will be taught by an accomplished artist. Military drill will be a feature. A local physician has agreed to give an hour once a week lecturing on first aids, etc., etc. Many PLACE YOUR WANT other helpful and useful things will be given.

The constitution is printed below and will serve to answer some questions not answered here.

CONSTITUTION OF THE YOUNG MEN'S CLUB Of Downers Grove.

#### PREAMBLE.

We, the subscribers, desirous of the spir itual, intellectual, social and physical wel For raising, lowering or underpinning any fare of the young men and impressed with the importance of concentrated effort, to this end do hereby form an organization therefor, and adopt for the government thereof the following

#### CONSTITUTION. ARTICLE I. NAME AND OBJECT.

Section 1. The name shall be the Young Men's Club of Downers Grove. Sec. 2. The object shall be the intellectual, social and physical welfare of the young men of our village. ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All young men over 16 years Sec. 2. The membership dues shall be Sec. 7. No building shall be permitted to Fifty Cents (\$.50) per month, payable in advance. The membership year shall commence the first of the month succeeding the

election of the member. Sec. 3. Any member who is in acrears for dues may be dealed the privilege of voting, and, if in arrears two months, shall forfeit ail the privileges of membership. Sec. 4. All applicants for membership receiving two thirds of all the votes cast at any regular business meeting shall be declared elected.

Sec. 5. Any member who is found guilty of immorality or misconduct injurious to the Club may be suspended or expelled therefrom by a three-fourths vote. But before any such action is taken the accused shall have the right to appear in person before said Club, interrogate witnesses and introduce testimony rebutting the charges.

Sec. 6. After having been expelled a man can regain membership only on presentation to the Club at any of its regular bustnean meetings, of a petition requesting readmission signed by three-fourths of the place. members and approved by the Board of Directors.

tles on the first day of February. The members of the first Board shall be elected as follows: Members from the churches by action of the respective churches interested; the two at large by the present general committee and the member from the tlub as soon as it shall have been organized and officered. They shall assume their duties immediately on appointment and shall serve for the balsoce of the year. Sec. 2. The Board of Directors shall

and shall be a Board of Trustees for its Sec. 3. The Board of Directors shall hold its first business meeting within fifteen (13) days following Pebruary 1st of each year, when there small be chosen by ballot from

its own number a President, a Vice President, a Recording Secretary and a Treasnrer, who shall hold office for one year or until their successors are ready to assume the duties of their office. sec. 4. The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held at such time as the Board shall decide. A

majority of the Directors shall constitute Sec. 5. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, he shall endeavor to enlist the members in the work, appoint committees and have general supervision

of the work of the Club of which he shall be Manager. He shall he ex cff lo a memher of all committees of the Board of Directors and of the Club. Sec. 6. The Vice President shall, in the absence of the President, have all the powers and perform all the duties of the Pres

Sec. 7. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all business meetings of the Board. he shall notife churches and the Club of the need of appointment of members to the Board either regularly or to fill vacancies. He shall notify officers, committeemen and members of their appointment or election and also of the meetings of the Board. He shall perform such other duties as ordinarily devolve upon a Recording Secre-

Sec. 8. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Board under the direction thereof, and shall pay bills only after they have been approved and ordered paid by the Board, and shall preserve the bills as vouchers. He shall collect subscriptions. and shall keep a complete account of all receipts and disbursements.

Sec. 9. Vacancies occurring in the Board

of Directors shall be filled as follows: from churches or Club, by action of the re-spective bodies; if at large, by rote of the remaining members of the Board. ARTICLE IV. THE CLUB.

Section 1. Immediate control of the busi ness of the Club shall be in the hands of the membership, who shall be responsible for the current expenses of the organization and any others which they shall, officially,
