"Squaw bread" was also made in large quantities and other delicacies furnished were pies, cakes, canned blackberries, dried peaches, tea and coffee,

The feast was spread upon the floor and all present, including the white people, were expected to partake of it. A long grace or prayer was said before eating and the peace pipe was smoked The first feast was held on Sunday and another one at the house Monday, followed by one at the grave. Monday afternoon the box containing the body was taken to the grave, which was a hole only about a foot deep, intended only to steady the coffin. The box was placed in here and a peaked top was put on with holes bored in it to furnish air. Kack-Kack's cane and his
