Fire constitutes the greatest single tax levied upon us. Even in a normal year, says Moody's Magazine, fire costs us \$200,000,000. And about every second year is an abnormal one. In 1904 we had the Baltimore conflagration, and in 1906 the San Francisco fire, making the latter year's losses about \$500,000,000. We have paid in premiums \$1,610,000,000 in ten years. In 1905 we paid \$106,000,000 and got back the magnificent sum of \$95,000,000 as a salvage for about \$400,000,000 waste. Note, too, that nearly 7,000 lives are wiped out by fire annually, and that 36,000 lives are directly exposed to destruction every day in the year. New York has 10,000 fires a year, Chicago 5,000.

WIRSCHING ASKS AN APOLOGY AND PLANS THE CASE. One of the most and yet one of the most convincing addresses on the temperance question ever heard in Downers Grove, was delivered by Rev. Samuel H. Wirsching at the Methodist church last Sunday evening, March 22d. A large number of citizens responded to the invitation to taxpayers to come and hear some of the statements made by the liquor dealers shown up in their true light. Rev. Wirsching asked the question: "Are saloons a benefit or an injury to a community?" He stated that he would not decide this question, but that his hearers were to act as the judge and jury after hearing the facts, which he proceeded forthwith to present. The speaker claimed that the statements made by the brewers and distillers were based upon fraud and misrepresentation, and gave evidence to support his claim. "Any institution," said the speaker, "that has got to defend itself, is on the verge of defeat, and it will come sooner or later. It could stand on a basis of right and truth if it had a right to the support of the people." As an instance of their falsifying, Rev. Wirsching stated that the liquor men had misquoted the Saturday Evening Post in one of the liquor publications. The Post was quoted as saying that "prohibition was a failure in Georgia." What the Post really did say was, "The liquor men say that prohibition is a failure in Georgia." Rev. Wirsching was not inclined to think that the first four words of the true quotation were omitted unknowingly. From a letter received from the Saturday Evening Post by a lady in Elgin, Ill., it is understood that the publishers will investigate this matter further.

Some statements made in advertisements in the daily press were reviewed. The fact of these being more prejudicial per 1,000 population in the prohibition State of Illinois was explained. The speaker called attention to the fact that a federal prison was located at Leavenworth, Kansas. More than half the prisoners in this institution, were said not to be from Kansas, but from other States—some from Illinois. In addition to that Rev. Wirsching stated that 500 more of the prisoners in the State of Kansas were from Oklahoma, which State has rented space in Kansas prisons—Kansas hasn't use for all her jails. Summing it up he stated that only six or seven hundred of the 3,000 prisoners in Kansas came from that State. This misstatement of fact did not appear to the speaker to be made unknowingly. Regarding taxation, Rev. Wirsching exhibited a chart on which were displayed figures showing taxator rates of both liquor and anti-liquor towns and villages, which seemed to show very convincingly that the latter had the smaller rate in every instance. It was stated that the Anti-Saloon League had issued a deft to the liquor dealers to cite a single instance to the contrary. As a further evidence of the benefit of the no-licensing policy the speaker stated that the savings per capita in the State of Maine (prohibition) were \$140,000, while in Illinois it was less than \$40,000.
