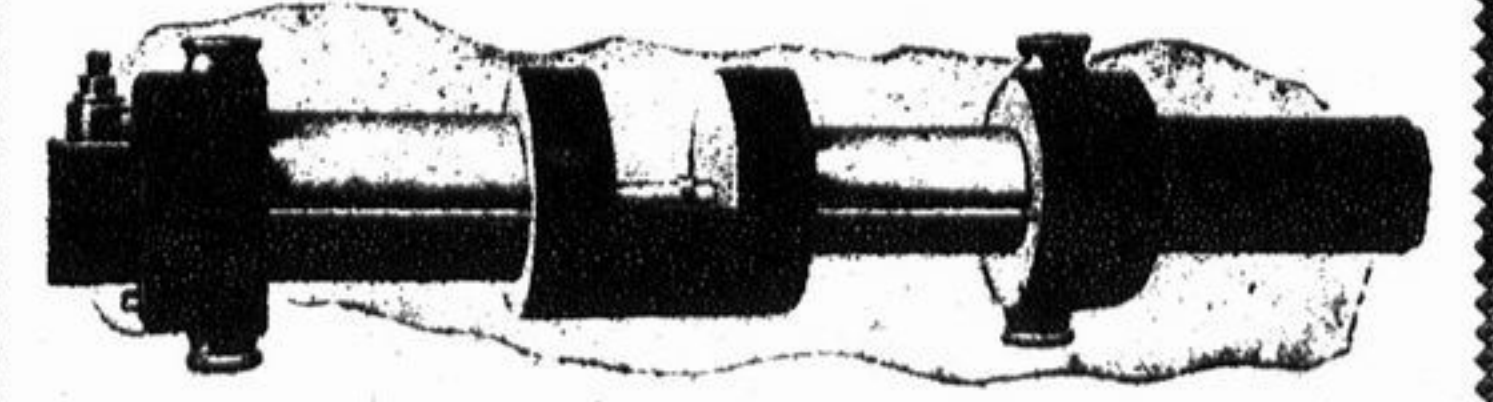

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD AT THE COURT HOUSE IN WHEATON, ON MONDAY, THE 30TH DAY OF MARCH, A. D., 1908.

Meeting called to order, with Supervisor Fischer presiding.

On roll call all members present except Supervisor Scott.

Minutes of the last preceding meeting read, and on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, were declared approved.

All bills and communications on file with the Clerk were read, and the claims referred to the respective committees.

On motion of Supervisor Steven, Supervisor Churchill was appointed commissioner to look after the burial of indigent soldiers of the Civil and Spanish wars for Du Page County.

On motion of Supervisor Steven, the Clerk was directed to issue a county warrant in favor of Amos Churchill, commissioner, for \$25.00 in payment for the burial of John Peterson, an indigent war veteran.

The resignation of E. R. Howe and wife, Superintendent and Matron at the county farm, was read and, on motion of Supervisor Churchill, was accepted.

The following resolution was on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt declared unanimously adopted and approved, and the Clerk was directed to forward copy of same to Superintendent Howe and wife.

Whereas, Mr. and Mrs. Howe, Superintendent and Matron of the county farm and almshouse, have felt constrained to resign their positions at the county farm on account of ill health, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors that we express our sorrow at parting and gratitude for their ten and one-half years of faithful and efficient service, a service approved year by year by the Board of Supervisors, commended by each and every grand jury; a service that has endeared them to the hundreds of unfortunate that have received their fatherly and motherly care.

The application of C. D. Bartlett and wife for their appointment as superintendent and matron at the county farm, was on motion of Supervisor Churchill, accepted, and C. D. Bartlett and wife were declared appointed superintendent and matron at the county farm at the same salary and under the same conditions as now existing.

The report of E. R. Howe, Superintendent of County Farm, was read, and on motion of Supervisor Steven, was declared approved and ordered filed.

The following report of the grand jury for the March term, A. D., 1908, was read, and on motion of Supervisor Churchill was declared approved and ordered of record.

To the Honorable Linus C. Ruth, Judge of the Circuit Court of Du Page County, Illinois:

The grand jury empanelled for the March term, 1908, of this court, beg leave to submit the following report in accordance with the statute in such cases made and provided:

They report that they have examined all complaints made to them, and here-with return to court fourteen true bills, and they further report that no bills were voted.

They further report that in accordance with the instructions of the court, they have examined the county jail and almshouse, and that they find the jail and court house in excellent condition, well cared for and well preserved.

They wish to commend the management of Sheriff Gorham for the cleanliness and order prevailing at the county jail.

The grand jury further report that they have made an exceedingly thorough examination of the buildings at the county farm and find them in perfect condition as to cleanliness and order. The inmates are well cared for, and it is readily observed that they are treated with the utmost kindness and consideration. We believe that Superintendent and Mrs. Howe, who have given the strength and health of the best years of their lives to this work, are entitled to the gratitude of the citizens of Du Page County for their humane and highly successful administration of this institution.

They also wish to state that they believe the supervisors have acted wisely and with discretion in their expenditure of county funds at the county farm.
