Board of Supervisors of Du Page County.

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, at a special meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton, on Wednesday, the 22d day of April, A. D. 1908, pursuant to the following call, which was duly published:

Wheaton, Ill., April 16, 1908. To H. F. Lawrence, County Clerk and ex-Officio Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, Illinois:

Supervisors. The board was called to order by the Clerk and on motion of Supervisor Churchill, Supervisor Steven was chosen temporary chairman. The credentials of the newly elected members were then examined and read, and being considered in the form, the newly elected members having qualified and filed their bonds, were, on motion of Supervisor Cramer, declared members of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County.

On roll call all members answered to their names except Supervisor Fairbank, the full board consisting of the following members: George A. Fischer, Fred Neddermeyer, John Schramer, A. H. Fairbank, W. W. Steven, Amos Churchill, Wm. Hammerschmidt, George Boger, C. B. Bldgett, Frank H. Cramer, Irving Goodrich and George A. Keller.

On motion of Supervisor Churchill, Supervisor Fischer was unanimously elected chairman of the Board of Supervisors for the ensuing year by a rising vote.

Minutes of the last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the board took a recess of twenty minutes to permit the chair to make up the committees for the year following.
