LABOR LEGISLATION
Governor Approves Two Important Measures Passed by the General Assembly.

NEW DUTY FOR THE EMPLOYERS
They Must Furnish Prompt Information to the State Commissioners of Labor - Examination of Miners.

Springfield, Ill., June 9.—Two important measures affecting labor that were passed by the Forty-Fifth General Assembly have been approved by Governor Deneen.

REPORT OF INJURIES.
An act approved May 24, 1907, in force July 1, 1907, requires that every employer of labor in this state shall report to the bureau of labor statistics every serious injury...

SUPPORT OF GOVERNOR DENEEN.
In closing their report the miners had the following to say concerning the support they received from the chief executive:

EVIDENCE OF EXPERIENCE.
"Every person applying for a certificate of competency or to entitle him to be employed as a miner must produce evidence of having had not less than two years' practical experience as a miner or with a miner and in no case shall an applicant be deemed competent unless he appear in person before the said board and orally answer, intelligently and correctly, at least twelve practical questions propounded to him by said board pertaining to the requirements of a practical miner."

HELD ADVANCED POSITION.
