

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, at its regular meeting held in the court house in Wheaton, on Monday, the 8th day of June, A. D. 1908, pursuant to statute.

Meeting called to order with Supervisor Fischer presiding. On roll call all members present. Minutes of the last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

All bills and communications on file with the clerk were read and the claims referred to the respective committees.

On motion of Supervisor Churchill the bill of Dr. J. M. Manry of \$100.00 for the care of one Henry Fischer of Roselle, was referred to the Committee on Claims.

On motion of Supervisor Fairbank the Board took a recess to 1:30 this day.

On reconvening the following report of Committee on Claims was, on motion of Supervisor Churchill, approved: Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors:

The claims of E. B. Howe, \$28.51, and C. D. Bartlett, \$28.70, for care of county inmates to June 1, as per their respective bills, which were previously paid upon the O. K. of the county farm committee, were examined and found correct.

The bill of R. B. Steven Coal Company referred back to the Committee on Supplies; the claim of C. A. Dolinger referred back to Committee on Claims for investigation; the claim of Illinois Asylum for Feeble minded Children, we recommend returned to the institution for correction.

The claim of Dr. Manry for professional services rendered Henry Fischer of Roselle, your committee finds that the said Henry Fischer is not a county charge, therefore we would recommend that the bill be not allowed.

The following report and resolution by the county farm committee was, on motion of Supervisor Churchill, declared approved: To the Honorable Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, Illinois:

Your county farm committee would most respectfully report that they met

at the county farm on May 1st, 1908, and audited the accounts of Mr. E. R. Howe, whose term of office expired on that date on account of his resignation. We found that the total receipts for the last sixty days since the last accounting were \$1,888.63. Total amount paid out as per vouchers, 2,317.34.

Leaving a balance due Mr. Howe of \$428.71. We also find accounts receivable amounting to \$1,539.20. Accounts payable, 841.11.

Leaving a balance of bills receivable, \$685.06. Which were turned over to the incoming superintendent, Mr. CND. Bartlett. Your committee would most respectfully recommend that the superintendent and matron, who are county officers, be paid as other county officers and not by themselves as heretofore, and by a unanimous vote of your committee we offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors at this session of the board that the clerk of this board be instructed, and he is hereby authorized, to issue a county warrant to Superintendent C. D. Bartlett on the first of each of every month, the sum of \$100.00, the amount due himself and matron for the previous month's services.

Your committee are of the opinion that more frequent accounting would be more desirable; that they ought to meet on the first of each and every month and pass on all bills for and against the county, and that the board should meet every month not later than the 10th and audit all bills and accounts, as better supervision can then be had and better results obtained.

The following report of committee on rules was, on motion of Supervisor Steven, declared and approved: Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors:

Gentlemen—Your committee on rules recommend the following: GENERAL RULES AND RULES GOVERNING COUNTY FARM.

1. That hereafter all transient cases where the county may become liable for medical and surgical services and care the case may be must be notified as soon as possible, and in case he cannot be found, then the nearest supervisor in the County shall be notified by the person having the case in charge. And that hereafter all bills for transient paupers must be accompanied by verified statements setting forth facts and circumstances by the county agent authorizing such expense, and further, that all allowances will be based on prevailing prices and fees.

2. No supervisor shall send to the county farm, nor shall the superintendent thereof, receive any person who has any contagious or infectious disease, nor any person who has been exposed to such disease, until after a reasonable time has elapsed since such exposure.

3. No pauper or paupers shall be admitted to the county farm without a written order from the supervisor of the township from which the pauper or paupers may come.

4. No bonded incurable insane person who may have been sent from Du Page County to any public insane institution in the State of Illinois and turned out by such public institution shall be received by the superintendent of the county farm unless an order to admit such person to the county farm is received from the proper authorities of said county.

5. The conservator, relative or friend of a bonded incurable insane person shall, before such person is received into the county farm, file with the county clerk a bond in the penal sum of \$500, with two good and sufficient sureties, said bond running to the people of the State of Illinois for use of Du Page County, and conditioned for the payment of all charges for the board (at the rate of \$3.00 per week), clothing and funeral expenses of such bonded incurable insane person, and for the removal of such incurable insane person from said farm when ordered.

6. When the said county farm shall become full and there is or are any pauper or paupers who is or are entitled to be placed at said farm, then the Farm Committee may notify the conservator, relative or friend of any bonded incurable insane person then at said farm to remove such bonded incurable insane person from said farm within such time as the said committee shall name. It shall be in the discretion of said committee to determine which of the bonded incurable insane persons shall be so removed from said farm.

7. A competent physician and surgeon shall be employed by the County Board by the year to attend all persons needing medical and surgical services at the county farm, and prisoners at the county jail. The clerk of the board shall advertise once in any newspaper published in Wheaton, Illinois, for bids, and the County Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

8. The superintendent of the county farm shall send to the supervisor in each township statements each month, to-wit: On the first day of each month, showing what is due to the county from the respective townships for the board and clothing of paupers at the farm, and like statements shall also be sent at the same time by the superintendent to the conservators or relatives of the respective bonded incurable insane persons, showing what is due the county for clothing and board of such bonded incurable insane persons as fixed by the County Board.

All payments which shall become due the county as above provided by the respective townships for maintaining its paupers at the county farm and all payments which shall become due the county for the care of any bonded incurable insane person at the county farm, as above provided, shall be paid to the superintendent of the county farm on or before the fifteenth day of every month in each year, and the receipt of

the superintendent shall be taken therefor.

9. No bills shall be allowed unless a. k'd by member or members of the proper committee.

Moved by Supervisor Churchill that the salary of the Board of Review for the year 1908 be fixed at \$5.00 per day. Motion declared carried.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, Allen F. Bates was appointed assistant clerk of the Board of Review for the year 1908 at a salary not to exceed \$300 per day.

The following resolution in regard to change of election districts in the Town of Bloomingdale, was on motion of Supervisor Neddermeyer, declared approved and adopted:

Whereas, It appears to the County Board of Du Page County, Illinois, that Election Districts Nos. 1 and 2 of Bloomingdale Election Precinct, in said Du Page County, have more than 200 legal voters, and that the said election districts as they now exist are not arranged for the convenience of the voters of the said township, and

Whereas, The said County Board deems it to be the best interest of the said election districts to divide and readjust the said Election Districts Nos. 1 and 2 of Bloomingdale Election Precinct, and that the said election districts as hereinafter described will each contain as near as possible 200 legal voters; now therefore, be it

Resolved, By the County Board of said Du Page County, that the said Election Districts Nos. 1 and 2 be, and the same are hereby divided, into two election districts to be numbered respectively Election Districts Nos. 1 and 2 and Bloomingdale Precinct, and be it further

Resolved, That the said Election District No. 1 be and is hereby established and erected, and that the same shall comprise the territory described by metes and bounds, as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the northwest corner of Section 1 in said Bloomingdale township and running thence west on the north line of Du Page County to the northwest corner of Section 5 in said township; thence south on the west line of Section 5 to the southwest corner of said Section 5; thence east on the south line of said Section 5 to the half section line of said Section 5; thence south on a line parallel with the east line of Section 8 in said township to the south line of said Section 8; thence east on the southeast corner of said Section 8; thence south along the west line of Section 16 to the southwest corner of said Section 16; thence east on the west line of Section 16 to the southwest corner of said Section 16; thence south on the west line of Section 22, 27 and 34 in said township to the south line of said township; thence east along the south line of said township to the southeast corner of said Bloomingdale township; thence north along the east line of said Bloomingdale township to the northeast corner of said township; being the place of beginning, all in Township 40 North, Range 10 East of the Third Principal Meridian, Du Page County, Illinois, and be it further

Resolved, That Election District No. 2 is hereby established and erected, and that the same shall comprise the territory described by metes and bounds as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the northwest corner of said Bloomingdale township; being the northwest corner of Section 6 of said township; thence east on the north line of said Section 6 to the northeast corner of said Section 6; thence south on the east line of said Section 6 to the east line of said Section 6; thence east on the north line of Section 8 of said township to the half section line; thence south on the said half section line parallel with the east line of said Section 8 to the south line of said Section 8; thence east on the south line of said Section 8 to the southeast corner of said Section 8; thence south on the west line of Section 16 to the southwest corner of said Section 16; thence east on the west line of Section 16 to the southwest corner of said Section 16; thence south on the west line of Section 22, 27 and 34 in said township to the south line of said township; thence east along the south line of said township to the southeast corner of said Bloomingdale township; being the place of beginning, all in Township 40 North, Range 10 East of the Third Principal Meridian, Du Page County, Illinois, and be it further

Resolved, That the Town Hall in the Village of Bloomingdale in said township be and is hereby fixed and established for the place of holding elections in said Election District No. 1, and be it further

Resolved, That the store of Charles Tedrahn at Cloverdale in said election district No. 2, being the premises now occupied by the said Charles Tedrahn as a general store at Cloverdale, be and is hereby fixed and established for holding elections in said Election District No. 2.
