



Pastere for Hogs.

pork can be made from one acre of good pasture as from one ton of shorts or corp. The Minnesota experiment station says that clover makes the best hog pasture in that State, but Professor Waters of Missourl says that it is not safe or even desirable to rely upon a single crop, excepting alfalfa where it is an assured success, to furnish pasture for hogs throughout the season. He recommends a succession of pastures from the beginning of the season until the hogs are ready for market, making the feed richer and more concentrated toward the close of the season as we approach the finishing or fattening period. For this purpose recommends rest clover or alfalfa, cow
