GEN. STEVENSON PLEDGES HIMSELF.

Adlai Stevenson, being an old and astute campaigner, has begun his speculating with a promise to take State charitable institutions out of politics.

If he is elected governor, he says, he will put the institutions on an entirely nonpartisan basis. The officers of every institution shall be appointed, not for political service rendered or hoped for, but in recognition of their technical training, professional skill, aptitude and sense of duty.

Illinois voters will be disposed to take General Stevenson at his word. He is an elderly man who has no political designs in future beyond the four years' term as governor. He wants to crown a long life of usefulness by a final service to the people, his neighbors and friends in the State.

How could that be better done than by taking State charitable institutions out of politics and setting rid of the whole crew of political plunders who now are fattening on them, at the expense of taxpayers, and to the neglect, abuse and injury of their unfortunate inmates?

If General Stevenson is sincere and there can be no doubt of that, in view of all the circumstances, his ambition is a noble one. Should he succeed in realizing it, he will have done Illinois a service for which his name will be forever held in grateful remembrance.

The man who rescues the humane and feeble-minded of his State from the clutches of greedy and brutal politicians will live long in the memory of Illinois citizens.

On motion of Supervisor Boger the following report of committee on county farm in relation to the treatment of Julia Abbott was declared approved.

To the Honorable Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors:

As per the expressed will of the Board at its last session, we, the County Farm Committee, called a committee of physicians in the office of Dr. Barlow at Glen Ellyn, consisting of Dr. Richard B. Olson, of Lombard; Dr. J. Millard Murry, county physician, and Dr. Barlow, for the purpose of determining the condition of Miss Abbott, and to be advised as to the best method of curing her and restoring her to her normal condition.

At this conference of physicians were the county farm committee, superintendent and matron of the county farm, and Miss Pratt, who has had the care of Miss Abbott before her ailment and since. The attached physician's report is herewith submitted and the recommendations therein have to the present time been complied with.

We, the undersigned, legally qualified physicians, have this day examined Julia Abbott, a dependent minor, now a county charge, and find her to be suffering from a severe disease of the brain and spinal cord, complicated by epileptic fits.

It is our opinion that her condition is susceptible of some improvement

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
