



A Hunter of Graft

When he first began to follow the trail of Ruef and Schmitz and the other San Francisco grafters the charge was widely spread that Heney was a murderer. This charge was based on Heney's Tucson experience.

Heney was engaged to run down the San Francisco grafters as the result of a remark he dropped in a club in that city. He said that with \$100,000 back of him he could clean up the city politically.

Ruef until his arrest following the shooting of Heney was under bail of \$1,500,000 to answer seventy-eight indictments for bribery and various forms of municipal corruption.

When Heney took the task of uncovering the land frauds he stipulated that he should have a lump sum from the Government for his private practice. This was agreed to, and Heney gave all of his time to the work.

Heney is 49 years old. He has gained a reputation in the West second to no lawyer in the matter of vigorous attack. He has used in the San Francisco cases William J. Burns, formerly of the Secret Service of the United States, who worked with him in the Oregon land fraud cases.—Athens Globe.

LOCAL HAPPENINGS.

"Statistics have shown the great value of abundant food. Dr. J. Robertson, an eminent surgeon of Manchester, England, has remarked that the families of working people when well fed maintained their health surprisingly, even while living in cellars and he observed that during four years of prosperity the number of fever cases admitted to the Manchester House of Recovery were 421 a year, while in two pinching years 1,207 cases a year were admitted.

"To develop strong muscles we train them gradually to do strong work. In the same way we can, by judicious care, accustom even a weak stomach to digest hearty meals. But we cannot do this by forcing into the stomach more food than it calls for; we must first create the need of a greater quantity by a proper amount of bodily exercise. PIG FEASTS.

They Have Replaced Cannibalistic Parties in Papua. Though cannibalism used to be practised to a great extent in Papua it has now given place to pig feasts, which are extremely popular.

"The preparation of these feasts," says the Wide World Magazine, "often takes place days beforehand, for they are nothing if not movable. The feast is announced for a certain day, but at the appointed time all the necessary pigs may not have been brought in, or some expected visitors may not have arrived, or a pig already present may have straggled free from its bonds and have to be hunted for a day or two. But no one ever seems to mind the delay.

"On one such occasion there were nearly a thousand pigs present, and fifty pigs, 2,000 coconuts and huge piles of taro were distributed. The feast gives no amusement; that is a universal custom. The recipients likewise neither cooked nor ate a morsel until they got home, for it is considered good form in Papua to eat nothing, but to carry away everything, thus practically reversing our notions of hospitality.

"There was a great heap of diseased pig lying on the ground and the presiding genius of the feast, with his assistants, threw these violently toward the guests. Each important man had retainers, who ran forward and bore the joint off, while the less fortunate ones kept up a running fire of comment—identifying a pig's head as having been the contribution of some particular man, or reproving the hill folk for their awkward gait, telling them not to fear precipices on the coast, and so on."
