

USEFUL CAREER ENDED.

Labor Commissioner and College President Set New Standards.

Carroll Davidson Wright, president of Clark College, Worcester, Mass., who after suffering from diabetes for two years, leaves to his credit a splendid



unselfish devotion to during his career-work that leaves the world his debtor.

Mr. Wright was born near the Franklin Pierce farm, at Dunbarton, N. H., July 25, 1840, the son of Rev. Nathan and Eliza Clark Wright. He attended a preparatory school, but ill health made it impossible for him to enter college. In after years be became a lecturer at Columbia University, the Catholic University, Harvard, the University of Michigan and other institutions, and was made a trustee and chairman of executive committee of the Carnegie foundation.

Mr. Wright studied law after leaving a preparatory school. When the as did the old lady in the following Civil War began he enlisted in the Fourteenth New Hampshire Volunteers he was placed at the head of the department of statistics. He developed this department till it became recognized as the best State department of statistics in the country. Mr. Wright was appointed United States Commissioner of Labor in 1885.

He completed the eleventh United States census, in the compilation of which he set new standards for statisticians. Mr. Wright often said that was his ambition to raise the gathering of statistics to a science and be introduced in his work many methods which have been adopted by statisticians throughout the world.

In 1902 Mr. Wright was appointed Commission and in the next year he be- | tion. came president of Clark College, at Worcester, Mass. In 1907 he was decorated with the Cross of the Legion of Honor of France. He received honorary degrees from several institutions of learning and throughout his active life enjoyed the friendship of many him with a bright, rather pleased voice educators and men of affairs.
