The fight at Aurora between Aldrich and Raymond is a bitter one, and will draw out a big vote there.

Unless there is a corresponding vote in this county, the re-election of Judge Bishop will be imperiled.

If DuPage County does not want to lose her Judge, the people of this county must turn out and vote at these primaries.
