

SIR THOMAS LIPTON

The Merchant Prince of the World. ROM the time when he was ten years old and earning sixty cents a week as an errand boy in Glasgow, Sir Thomas Lipton has fought his way to success by tireless energy, working as he says: "twenty five hours a day."
