Applications for admit tance are coming in fast, one day last week 30 applied for admittance, and two days later 15 more; every day they are coming in, and the doctor has to tell them to wait until more tents are

One camp in one of the larger cities volunteered to build seven tents, or it other words, donated the money for seven tents, and so all over the United States, but we need still more. What is a colony of 60 tents when 45 applications are received in two days? Hundreds of tents are needed, but it takes money to build. I am very much pleased on my behalf of the Sauator ium. May the good work go on.
