To Camp 808, Downers Grove, Ill.:

Dear Neighbors—Permit me to drop you a few lines in regard to the Sanatorium and its treatment. Fifty-eight (58) patients are now enrolled, and all are doing nicely with the exception of a very few. ## DEATHS.

### ANDREW DILGER.

Mr. Andrew Dilger was born on May 27, 1852, in Winterbach, Province of Wurtemberg, Germany. At the age of 29 years he immigrated to the United States, settling temporarily in the state of Pennsylvania, where he found employment as a farm laborer with a Mr. William Fey. His manly Christian character and honest, faithful service so won the respect of his employer, that he was considered and treated as one of the family. In 1854 Mr. Fey moved to the State of Illinois, coming to Downers Grove township, and induced Mr. Dilger to accompany him. He remained with Mr. Fey until his marriage. On Oct. 28, 1858, he was united in holy matrimony to Christina Shafer, and from this union five children were born, four daughters and one son.

The son died in infancy; the daughters are all with us to-day. They are Mary, now Mrs. Henry Rath of Medford, Okla.; Emma, now Mrs. Fred Gerwitz; Lydia, now Mrs. F. J. Prentiss; and Elizabeth, now Mrs. John H. Sasse, all of Downers Grove.

Mr. Dilger and family lived for some years on his own farm three miles south of the village. About nineteen years ago he retired from the farm and came to live in the village.

On the 21st day of December, 1890, his beloved wife was taken to her eternal home. Since that time his home has been maintained and kept for him by his daughter, Mrs. John Sasse.

For two years he has been in poor health and for about three weeks was very seriously ill. At times his sufferings were intense. All that medical skill and careful nursing could accomplish was done to alleviate his suffering, but it was apparent to all that the end was near. He bore the severe pain with great fortitude and patience, having committed himself into the hands of Him "who doeth all things well."

He died at 7 o'clock Thursday morning, April 8, 1909. Mr. Dilger was for many years a faithful member of the German Evangelical church and later became identified with the Methodist Episcopal church, continuing in that fellowship until called to his heavenly home. In his death the church has lost a consistent, faithful member, the community an honest, upright citizen, his family a devoted, loving father. He was honored and respected by all who knew him and greatly beloved by his family and friends.

Of his kindred there remains in addition to the four daughters above mentioned, one brother, Mr. Adam Dilger of Waterloo, Ia., and five grand-children. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. F. F. Farniole, assisted by Rev. J. Stannin of the Methodist Episcopal church on Sunday afternoon and were very largely attended. The pastor paid a kindly tribute to the memory of the deceased and most earnestly commended the Christ in whom he trusted as the only Saviour and whose promises were the comfort of bereaved hearts. A quartet rendered several beautiful selections.

Among the mourners was Mrs. A. W. Stealy and Mrs. Edward Smith, daughters of his only brother, both of Dan-kerton, Ia.; Mr. Simon Shafer and family from Plainfield, Ill.; Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Leppert of Wheatland, Ill., and Mr. Samuel and Albert Hassert of Lemont, Ill.

The pallbearers were the following five sons of Mr. William Fey, the friend of his boyhood: Henry and William of Naperville, George, Louis and Morgan Fey of Chicago and Charles Liffner of Naperville, a son-in-law of Mr. Fey. The many costly floral tributes gave expression to the high esteem and affection of the many friends and neighbors for the deceased. The remains were interred in the family lot in the West Side cemetery.

### MRS. MARGARET CRAMER.

Funeral services of Mrs. Margaret Cramer were held in the First Methodist Episcopal Church on Saturday afternoon, April 10th. The body was taken for burial to the Fairview Cemetery in Cass. But a few weeks ago the remains of her husband were buried at that place.

Mrs. Cramer, whose maiden name was Guthrie, was born on the Island of Shapinska, in the Orkney Islands, on Nov. 12, 1819. She was married to Mathias D. Cramer in 1843. They have been residents of Downers Grove for about twenty-five years.

When but 12 years of age she joined the Free Presbyterian Church of Kirkwall under the ministry of Rev. Mr. Patterson.

During their residence in Downers Grove both herself and husband were regular attendants of the Methodist Episcopal Church until age and physical infirmity made it impossible for her to attend. She died at the home of her son in Aurora at 9:45 a. m. Friday, April 8, 1909.

She is survived by two sons and one daughter, Adolphus J. Cramer of Aurora, Francis H. Cramer of Downers Grove and Mrs. J. L. Peace of New York city.

### JOHN G. WIMMER.

John G. Wimmer died of tuberculosis of the throat at his home, 726 Harding avenue, Chicago, Monday, April 12. The body was taken to the Catholic church at Naperville Thursday and

interment was made in the Naperville cemetery. He was a wife and two children. Mr. Wimmer was a member of the Woodmen of the World, a member of the Electrotypers' Union of Chicago. Mr. Wimmer made a hard fight for his life, making two trips to Denver, where he spent most of the last four years. He was well known and liked in the village, and his many friends sympathize with his family.

### MRS. FRED TIMKE.

Mrs. Fred Timke died suddenly of apoplexy at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Fred Timke, on Sunday, April 11, 1909, age 71 years, 2 months and 10 days. She leaves a sorrowing husband, eleven children, eleven grand-children and one great-grandchild; also five step-children and a large circle of friends to mourn her loss.

Mr. and Mrs. Timke lived happily together for more than fifty-three years. Funeral from her home Thursday, April 15, at 1 p. m. Interment was made at Elm Lawn cemetery, Elmhurst, Ill.
