## HEYROLET WINS CUP IN MOTOR CAR RACI

35,000 Persons Cheers Victors in West's First Big Automobile Meet.

MATSON TAKES INDIANA TROPHY

Saring Drivers Defy Curves of Death, and Machines Reach a Speed of Mearly 100 Miles an Hour.

Amid plaudits from shricking thousands, Joe Matson, a Western speed annihilator, on Friday won the Indiana Trophy stock chassis race, the first event in the West's big two-day automobile meet. He drove his 25.6 horse power Chalmers-Detroit car over 232-74 miles on the Crown Point-Lowell course in 4:31:21, or at an average speed of 511/4 miles an hour. He was sixteenth and last to start and third to cross the tape. The redoubtable George Robertson, winner of the Vanderbilt cup race last fall, was second in the Locomobile, covering the ground in 4:39:03. In third place ran A. Monsen, in a Marion car, his time being 4:42:03. Terrific bursts of speed were made at times over the best portions of the roadway, Burman in a Buick making one lap around the 23.27-mile course in 23:41, near enough to be a mile a minute to call it such.

Not a racer was spilled and not a car turned turtle. The pilots went around the curves discreetly instead of precipitately. They had been cautioned by their managers against being foolishly reckless and they took no more chances than needed at treacherous spots.

Chevrolet Wine Cobe Cup. Out of a Beld of twelve speed demone Louis Chevrolet Saturday won the Cobe Cup race—the West's premier auto prize-driving his Buick car over 395.66 miles on the Crown Point-Lowall course in 8:01:39, or at the rate of 49.3 miles an hour.

"Billy" Bourque, in the Knox, came second, beaten for first place by a margin of :01:05, while George Robertson, in his Locomobile, got third place, his time being 8:14:30. Because he started tenth and was crowded closely in the final laps, Chevrolet followed Bourque over the tape. In spurts of speed nearly 100 miles an hour was reached.



HELEN F. MEARS

A Noted American Sculptor. "Her work is as strong as a man's, and has, in addition, a subtle, intangible

quality exceedingly rare and spiritual," was the generous tribute paid by one sculptor genius, St. Gaudens, to his pupil, Miss Helen Farnsworth Mears.

At an age when most little girls are interested in dolls and the manufacture of mud-pies, the little fingers of this American sculptor were modeling in putty, in Oshkosh, Wis., her birth-place. Before she was nine, she had modeled an original head of Apollo, which was the wonder at the County Fair, where it was exhibited, For a number of years subsequent to this, she exhibited annually a model of Hope, Repentance, or some other allegorical figure, far beyond what one could conceive

the unagination of a child would grasp. While at the Normal College, her modeling at home, under the kindly inspiration and criticism of her father, filled her mind and heart far more than her regular studies. In 1893, the Milwaukee Women's Club offered a prize of \$500 for the best work of art by a Wisconsin woman, to be exhibited at the World's Fair in Chicago. Miss Mears' heroic symbolic figure of "Wisconsin," which was later put in marble and placed in the rotunds of the State Capitol at Madison, captured the prize. This was a signal triumph for a girl whose entire professional art training up to that time had been only a six weeks' experience in the Art Institute in Chicago.

A year and a half of study under St. Gaudens, in New York, followed by three years in the best atcliers of Paris, under Puesch, Collins, Merson, Charpentier, and other famous teachers, broadened her mind, increased her mastery of technique and gave surety and strength to her imagination and her treatment. After a brief stay under the artistic inspiration of Italian skies, Miss Mears was called by her old master, St. Gaudens, to assist in his Paris studio, but soon after returned to America and started bravely on her own work in sculpture, in New York,

Upon her ambitious "Fountain of Life," a large symbolic wall fountain fourteen feet high and filled with life-size figures. Miss Mears put the best work of four years. It was exhibited at the St. Louis Fair, receiving a place of honor, and was awarded a medal.

Her most successful statue is that of Francis E. Willard, in Statuary Hall, at the Capciel in Washington. It is more than a mere portrait; it is a soul interpretation, revealing the sweetness, strength, simplicity and security of the great philanthropist and educator. Among Miss Mears' latest works is an exquisite portrait of her mother, a portrait relief of the well-known ersayist, Louise Collier Willers, and a bas-relief and also portrait bust of Edward A. McDowell, the wellknown musician.


