For years he was one of the leading mason contractors of Naperville, and many beautiful homes stand as monuments of his mechanical skill. His life was full of labor and toil and industry resulting in the erection for himself of a beautiful home on Wright street, where the last five years of his life were spent. In the winter of 1907 the deceased united with the Methodist Church of this city. He died not as one without hope, but as one full of faith in the mercy and love of Christ. The drama of life has been enacted, but the memory of him remains with us to help and strengthen us in the conflict. ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE An Ordinance Providing for the Annual Appropriation of the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois. Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois: Section 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, and the same are hereby appropriated for the objects and purposes herein specified for the municipal fiscal year commencing the first day of May, A. D. 1909, as follows: For lighting of streets and alleys \$2,250.00 For repairing streets and alleys 1,000.00 For salaries of President, Trustees, Clerk, Treasurer, Attorney and policemen 2,000.00 For wages of other employees and laborers and miscellaneous 100.00 For interest on General Improvements Bonds 495.00 For interest on General Improvement Bonds 700.00 For Sinking Fund and payment of General Improvement bonds 1,500.00 Total \$8,045.00 Sec. 2. Any sum of money heretofore appropriated and not heretofore expended and now in the treasury of the Village of Downers Grove, or that may hereafter come to the treasury of the Village of Downers Grove, is hereby appropriated by this ordinance. Sec. 3. All unexpended balances, or any item or items of any appropriation made by this ordinance may be expended for making up any deficiencies in any item or items of this appropriation. Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
